

MACAULAY TELLS OF SHIPWRECKS

Chiusa Maru Libel Case Leads to Yarn Spinning in Judge Dole's Court.

The value of the various services rendered in refloating the Japanese S. S. Chiusa Maru by the Inter-Island steamers Kinau and Ke Au Hou were gone into in the Admiralty Court yesterday before Judge Dole. The testimony of Captain Macaulay, of the pilot office, who went on board the steamship immediately after she grounded on the reef and who took charge of the work of getting her off, and that of Captain Tullett, of the steamer Ke Au Hou was heard. Captain Macaulay, in testifying to the experience he had had in salvaging wrecks in two oceans, in which he had taken part as salvor. In regard to the case of the Chiusa Maru he gave the credit for the best services rendered to the steamer Kinau, which had the most advantageous position for pulling upon the stranded steamship. Of the three vessels at work the U. S. R. C. Manning had the least advantageous position for effective work. Captain Tullett described the share his vessel, the Ke Au Hou, had had in the work. He justified his use of the term "perilous position" which he had used in stating the position of the steamer, by explaining that he considered any vessel at work about a stranded steamship on a coral reef to be in a perilous position. BABCOCK LIBELS COMPROMISED. The three libels filed against the American ship W. F. Babcock by members of her crew, alleging ill-treatment and an insufficiency of proper food, were settled out of court yesterday and the libels withdrawn. The basis of settlement has not been given out.

ESTATE OF MARY T. NUI. A petition asking for letters of administration of the estate of Mary T. Nui was filed yesterday in the Circuit Court by John T. Nui, husband of the deceased, who names himself and Mrs. Halli Kapaki, sister of the deceased, as the only heirs. The estate is valued at \$1388, of which \$888 is represented by an insurance policy on the life of the petitioner and the balance consisting of two blocks of real estate in Maui and a one-half interest in a lot in Kailhi, Honolulu.

THE COURT MADE THE MOTION. After hearing argument yesterday in the Supreme Court on a motion to dismiss Harry T. Mills vs. J. S. Walker, the case was ordered stricken from the calendar on the court's own motion. Judge Humphreys appeared for the plaintiff, Geo. A. Davis representing the defendant.

CRAWFORD MUST STAND TRIAL. Judge Robinson heard argument yesterday on the motion to quash the indictment returned by the grand jury against Willie Crawford for conducting a gambling house. The motion was denied and the plea continued until this morning. The motion to quash the indictments against Lau Tung Piu et al, charged with an assault with a deadly weapon, was also denied.

COURT NOTES. J. H. Gibson has filed a withdrawal of appeal in his action against K. Kagawa in summary proceedings, landlord and tenant. A withdrawal was yesterday filed by the plaintiff in the case of John K. Sumner vs. the Territory of Hawaii. An order was issued yesterday by Judge Lindsay directing the furnishing of a transcript and concerning the bill of exceptions in the Territory of Hawaii vs. Ake. Argument was presented yesterday in the matter of F. J. Testa against J. P. Kahalawai et al in the Supreme Court on exceptions from Circuit Court, First Circuit, and also in the case of the Central Mills Company vs. A. J. Campbell, treasurer of the Territory. Replications to the answers of certain defendants in the Beef Trust cases were filed yesterday in the U. S. Court by United States District Attorney Breckons, bearing date of January 7. These replications number thirty-five, considerably less than the number of defendants in the cases.

A RAIN COAT LIFTED IN HALL OF JUSTICE. Leslie P. Scott, deputy clerk of the Judiciary, the other morning bought a cravenette rain coat. As it was raining hard at the opening hour he wore the garment on his way to the office and arriving there hung it upon a hook in the public area between the Supreme Court room and the quarters of the clerks. On preparing to leave the office at 4 p. m. Mr. Scott found that his new rain coat had been "pinched." Leastwise it could not be found. Mr. Scott would feel grateful if the borrower of his protective garment if he would return it between showers as long before the close of the rainy season as possible. It being assizes opening day, a large number of the criminal element was within the judiciary precincts yesterday. Yet it might reasonably be supposed that all the crooks were sufficiently guarded by the detail of officers for that purpose to keep them from taking advantage of the blindfolded goddess in her own temple.

GOVERNOR SIGNS DEATH WARRANT

Hilo Murderer to Pay Penalty for Crime Committed a Year Ago.

Governor Carter yesterday signed the death warrant of Morita Kaizo, the Japanese convicted of murder in the first degree in Hilo last March.

The murder was a brutal one, the victim having been called from his room on New Year's evening and beaten with a club, and afterwards butchered with a Japanese cleaver. The murderer and his victim were rivals for the position of leader in the notorious Finakashi gang, the former leader, whose name the crowd bore, having been convicted with his lieutenant, Watanabe, of murder in the second degree and conspiracy to murder. On one charge they were sentenced to twenty-five and thirty-five years, respectively, and on the conspiracy charge each was given an additional ten years. These men are now in Oahu penitentiary. It was Morita Kaizo's case that sent the question of eligibility of jurors naturalized by a circuit judge to the Supreme Court for settlement. His attorney dropped the case after this question was decided, and the court appointed two attorneys to defend him. When the man had been convicted, and was called up for sentence, the attorney originally employed asked to be entered as an attorney in the case, as the prisoner's friends had retained him to appeal the case. When the matter was brought before the Supreme Court it was not argued, the attorney merely submitting a five-page brief, and on this showing the judgment of the lower court was confirmed. Judge Gear then announced that he would appeal the case to Washington on the question of legality of the action of a circuit court judge in naturalizing aliens. Nothing has been heard of the case since then until the action of the Governor yesterday.

The appeal of the Central Milk Company against the assessment by Treasurer Campbell, who taxed on the authorized instead of the actual capital of the company, had a hearing in the Supreme Court yesterday, argument being submitted.

In the Supreme Court a motion to establish the bill of exceptions in the assumpsit proceedings of Mills vs. Walker was filed yesterday by George A. Davis, attorney for the defendant. The motion will be presented on Friday.
