
CURFEW WILL RING.

It is the opinion of the Sheriff that the children of Honolulu have been allowed to run loose too long. The number of arrests made recently among the juveniles and the large number of cases of petty thieving that have been brought to the attention of the department has determined the Sheriff into putting into operation the Curfew Law, long a dead letter. It has been shown that late hours on the streets at night and craps during the day have been the causes for the lapses from grace of so many boys, the nights giving them an opportunity to indulge in petty thefts to raise the money for the dice games. Hereafter all young boys and girls must be at home after the hour of nine o'clock at night. If found out on the streets, unaccompanied by some older person, they will be arrested and locked up at the police station. This law is to go into effect now and the policemen and special officers have been given orders to make examples of the first offenders against the Curfew Law that they may find.
