The trustees of Oahu College offer a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who set fire to the residence of the president on the night of June 3.

According to Japanese hotelkeepers, 810 Japanese from plantations on Oahu and about 280 who arrived in the Kinau on Saturday, making 1090 altogether, will leave in the steamer Kumeric for Vancouver.

Prof. W. Hart will deliver a lecture this evening at the rooms of the Kilo-hana Art League on "The Story of Photography." The lecture will commence at 8 o'clock. The members of the League and their friends are all invited to be present.

David A-i is showing some excellent corn grown on his mother's place in the Palolo valley. The ears are as large as those which take prizes in Kansas and the quality is fine. Palolo valley would have marketed many garden products here but for the fact that it has no suitable road.

While "resting" on the Koolau side of the Pali, High Sheriff Henry figured the cost of needed repairs to the Kaneohe jail and courthouse. He made it \$500 or thereabout. The High Sheriff reports the roads in bad condition. For repairs on a piece of road lately done at a cost of about \$200, the local road supervisor and the laborers are still waiting for their pay.

Harry Daniels, the youngest of the well-known Daniels family of Wailuku, died in San Francisco on May 21. His end must have been sudden, for his mother had received a letter from him written on the 17th, when he was apparently in good health. His body was found in the morgue by his friend, Mr. Rose, formerly of Hilo, awaiting a claimant. Daniels was employed in the Puunene mill, Maui, before leaving for the Coast. One of his sisters is the wife of Captain Lorenzen, the Honolulu pilot.

Proposals for supplying the naval station with all its supplies for the year beginning on July 1 next are being asked for by Paymaster Brooke and the contracts will be let within two weeks. These supplies include the commissariat supplies for the station, and practically everything bought. Proposals are also being asked for the services to be done during the year, which includes the work of hauling coal from the docks into the sheds, moving freight and such work. No public advertisement is made regarding these contracts, but any information can be secured regarding them from Mr. Brooke.

Acting Governor Atkinson went home early yesterday afternoon, having taken a cold.

Varied programs are in preparation in city public schools for the closing exercises on Friday.

Mrs. Gear, widow of the late Judge Geo. D. Gear, will leave for the Coast in the Sierra a week from Thursday.

Ralph Johnstone of the Internal Revenue office will return to Napoosop today for further inspection of the Okolehau distillery.

District Attorney Breckons and Marshal Hendry's presence in Hilo has aroused much curious speculation there as to the purpose of their visit.

Favoring rains and the efficiency of the electric pumping service give promise of a crop of 13,000 tons of sugar for McBryde plantation next season.

President Pinkham of the Board of Health will go to Waimea, Hawaii, the first of July to locate the proposed home for healthy boys from the Leprosy Settlement.

High Sheriff Henry will put a large force of prisoners, some of them skilled carpenters, at work today in providing sanitary conveniences at the public sea baths in Kapiolani Park.

George C. Beckley, Jr., has been heard from in his tour of Europe with his Belmont schoolmates, conducted by Prof. Shedd. The party were having a glorious time and had arrived at Antwerp.

Through the courtesy of the Kilo-hana Art League a meeting of the Hawaiian Photographic Society will be held in the league rooms this evening at about 9 o'clock, after Professor Hart's lecture.

A fire in a shed back of J. A. Law-law's house, Kakaako, arising from a homemade stove set on a box, was the cause of an alarm from box 27 at 12:10 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It was put out with a garden hose before the firemen arrived, though that was inside of five minutes after the alarm.

A telegraphic item in a Chicago paper states that Lorrin Andrews has been admitted to practise before U. S. District Judge Willey in Shanghai. It is also stated that the other lawyers who were excluded with Andrews on examination in January will bring impeachment proceedings against Willey.

About 8000 pounds of fish were caught off the Leper Settlement one day last week. President Pinkham of the Board of Health, from the incident, is more than ever convinced of the desirability of cold storage at the Settlement. In this instance it would have assured a supply of fresh fish for a long time.
