The T. K. K. S. Hongkong Maru reached port yesterday in time for the passengers to land and take a part in the celebrations of the day, being sighted off Koko Head shortly after noon and docking at the Hackfeld wharf at 2 o'clock.

The Hongkong Maru carries a small list of through passengers and brought four layover passengers for this port, Bishop Alex. McKay-Smith and Rev. H. W. Willis, bound for Shanghai, and Lieutenant L. von der Decken, of the German army, and L. F. von Pentz.

Among the through passengers is Wong Chientsu, the secretary of the Viceroy of Canton, who has been touring America. Mrs. Charles A. Stoveus, who is traveling with Mrs. George T. De Colmesnil, bound for Hongkong, is the wife of the Deputy Collector of the port of San Francisco.

The Maru brought 237 bags of mail, the accumulation of six days. She carried also a full cargo of freight, general merchandise for the Orient.

FLAGS FLEW ON WATERFRONT.

Every ship in the harbor was decorated in all her bunting yesterday in honor of the Fourth, the flags and streamers flying from sunrise to sunset. Evidence of the holiday was also seen along the front in the quietness prevailing about the many wharves, Hackfeld's being the only one at which any vessel docked or departed.

STEVENS' FIRST TRIP IN COMMAND.

A. G. Stevens, the acting commander of the Hongkong Maru, is making his maiden trip as commander of an ocean liner. He is taking the liner to Japan to turn her over to Captain Filmer, the second of the family to command on the Toyo Kisen Kaisa line.

KUMERIC LEAVES HARBOR.

The big emigrant steamer Kumeric shifted from her berth alongside the Quarantine wharf yesterday morning, steaming outside and dropping her anchor off port. Here she will probably stay until tomorrow, by which time it is hoped she will be able to get away with her human freight for Vancouver.

None of the outgoing Japanese have boarded the vessel as yet. Their baggage has gone to the quarantine station, where it will be thoroughly fumigated and the Japanese themselves will be carefully scrutinized for any sign of contagious disease.

NEXT MAIL BY SIBERIA.

The next mail for the Coast goes by the S. S. Siberia, due to arrive from the Orient on Monday next and sailing on Tuesday. From the Coast the Matson S. S. Hilonian will arrive on Friday, the 12th, bringing seven days' later mail, while the U. S. A. T. Sherman due on Saturday, will have another day's letters.

DEATH AT SEA ON THE NEVADAN

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—The steamer Nevadan, Captain Greene, which arrived yesterday morning, reported a stormy passage from Kahului, on the island of Maui. She brought eight passengers and 85,500 sacks of sugar. This is the second largest cargo of sugar she has ever carried, the record being 86,300.

The Nevadan brought to port the body of Euphonia D. Charters, 27 years old, of Hayward, who died at sea Saturday, of heart disease, superinduced by tuberculosis. His last moments were very pathetic, and he called constantly for his wife, from whom he was divorced two years ago.

Among the passengers on the Nevadan was John Stoddard, manager of the immense McBryde plantations in Hawaii. This is the first time that Stoddard has taken a vacation in sixteen years, and accompanied by his wife and son, they are starting for a trip around the world.

HEBBARD TRIED TO SHOOT HIMSELF

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—"Well, here goes—poor old Jack Hebbard—has never did a man a wrong in his life, yet they are always abusing him."

With these words, Judge J. C. B. Hebbard of the Superior Court yesterday, while in his chambers on Clay and Laguna streets, drew a loaded revolver, which he pointed at his head and would have blown out his brains had it not been for the alertness of a newspaper reporter, who had called upon Hebbard to interview him regarding the action recently taken by the Bar Association in his case.

It was only after a serious struggle that the reporter, aided by Frank Hart, the Judge's stenographer, who rushed into the chambers at the sounds of the scuffle, succeeded in wresting the weapon away from the Judge, and, no doubt, saved his life.

For some weeks past Hebbard has taken sorely to heart the charges made against him and the attitude of both bench and bar toward him. That his nerves were all unstrung has been manifested several times this year, particularly when he made a gun play in the Hotel Majestic, and later, when he went to the Hall of Justice and endeavored to get out a warrant for the arrest of Francis J. Heney. At both times he threatened to take life, and it was with the greatest effort that he was finally calmed.

STRAUS STARTS ON A LONG TOUR

Will Visit Hawaii to Study the Immigration Question.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Secretary Strauss of the Department of Commerce and Labor, accompanied by Mrs. Strauss and his private secretary, T. L. Weed, will leave Saturday on the most extensive trip ever undertaken by the head of that department.

Then he will go to San Francisco and will sail from that city July 25th for Honolulu. In the Hawaiian Islands Secretary Strauss will investigate immigration, giving special attention to the ebb and flow of foreigners.

The secretary said today: "I shall inquire thoroughly into Japanese immigration, but my inquiries will be just as careful as to the immigration from other countries. I want to see for myself how the new immigration laws are working. Beyond that my trip has no special significance."

ISLAND PRINCESS VISITS OAKLAND

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—Oakland is entertaining a princess unaware in the person of Miss Alice Schlemmer, who arrived yesterday from Laysan island, and went at once across the bay to the home of friends.

Before his emigration to the South Sea Islands forty years ago, Herr Schlemmer was the first white man to live on Laysan.
