### Items of World's Sport

**HENLEY, Eng., June 22.**-The Henley regatta entries were announced today to number 74, against 69 last year. The only foreigners are one Belgian and one German crew.  
**PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.**-Barney Oldfield drove his car a mile against time in 52 1/2 seconds to-day and a mile in a competition in 1 minute flat. Both are world's records.  
**MARBLEHEAD, Mass., June 22.**-The American squadron of Sonder yachts, which will go to Germany and Spain this summer, will be made up of the Spokane I, owned by Vice Commodore F. Lewis Clarke of the Eastern yacht club; Chewink the VIII, owned by F. G. Macomber Jr. of the Corinthian yacht club, and the Marblehead, owned by W. H. Joyce and Sumner H. Foster, also of the Corinthian yacht club. The Spokane I raced last year. The others are new boats. The German races will be begun on August 14, those in Spanish waters following.

**NEW LONDON, Conn., June 27.**-Before the largest crowd that ever witnessed a race on the Thames, the Yale crew, this evening, rowing on an average of four strokes to the minute less than Harvard, held the big Cambridge eight even until the last half mile, when the blue let out its speed and won a magnificent contest by a scant boat length. Not once in the whole four miles did the long graceful shells cease to lap one another. Thousands of persons who crowded the observation trains and all kinds of floating craft and those who lined the shore set up cheer upon cheer for the old rivals as they emerged from one of the grandest races in the history of boating.  
Yale's time for the four miles was 21 minutes and 10 seconds; Harvard's 21 minutes and 13 seconds.

**CHICAGO, June 27.**-George Slier, the famous fight referee and critic, himself a veteran of 2,000 contests in the roped arena, left the ring forever. Sixty years old, his health failing and the years of toil beginning to show, Slier bids farewell to the ropes. He will be 61 years of age on September 23 and it has been planned to tender the veteran a mammoth testimonial on that date in the form of an athletic carnival at the Coliseum.

St. Andrew's cathedral was the scene of a very popular wedding on Wednesday night, Canon Mackintosh performing the ceremony making Albert N. Campbell and Miss Josephine de Lartigue man and wife. The bride was charming, dressed in a simple white mull wedding dress with bridal veil and orange blossoms. She carried a beautiful bridal bouquet of white roses. She was supported by her sister, Miss Adele de Lartigue, who wore a becoming gown of blue organdie, her bouquet being of pink roses. The bride was given away by Bishop Restarick. Accompanying the groom as best man was his brother, E. M. Campbell. The ushers were Bruce Cartwright, Jr., Robert Shingle, Harold Giffard and William Williamson, close friends of the groom and associated with him in the Henry Waterhouse Trust Company, of which Mr. Campbell is treasurer.

Immediately following the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Campbell took a carriage for the Giffard residence on Tantalus, where they are spending the honeymoon. After their return to town they will reside at 1616 Piikoi street.

Bishop McKay Smith, bishop coadjutor of the diocese of Pennsylvania, and his chaplain, Rev. H. W. Wells, are at the Moana, having stopped off here en route to the Orient. Bishop McKay Smith is a prominent Anglican of the United States, having been rector of St. John's church, Washington, D. C., prior to his election to the bishopric. He is also one of the wealthiest clergymen in the Union.

**LIVINGSTON, Mont., June 27.**-Congressman Nicholas Longworth and his wife arrived early this morning for a two weeks' tour of the Yellowstone National Park. After the tour is made the couple will travel further west and will sail for Honolulu, where they will spend a month or two in a bungalow on Waikiki beach.

Prince Fushimi, of the Imperial family of Japan, was the most distinguished visitor entertained in Honolulu last week, spending part of two days here en route to his home from an extended tour of the British Isles and Canada, arriving on the British cruiser Monmouth. The welcome of the Japanese colony was spontaneous and enthusiastic, a lantern parade on Tuesday night being the most gorgeous public affair witnessed in the city for a long while, the Prince and the British vessel being serenaded and cheered. On the same evening a dinner was given by the Prince to a number of local officials at the Alexander Young Hotel. The order of precedence for the function was something that puzzled Host Hertsche for some time, being finally settled as follows. On either side of Prince Fushimi were seated Acting Governor Atkinson and Admiral Very, the other guests being Captain Tukey of the Monmouth, Consul General Mikki Saito, Consul Forster, Vice Consul T. Clive Davies, Lieutenant Kirby of the Monmouth, Colonel Jones, Colonel Johnson, M. C. Boba, Major Higoshi, Commander Takeuchi, Dr. T. Iwai and Mr. Nagasaki. The dining room was beautifully decorated with the entwined flags of America, Great Britain and Japan.


