### POLO GAMES START TUESDAY

When Maui Will Face Oahu  
Team at Moanalua  
Grounds.

The first game of polo between Oahu and Maui will start Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The second game will be on Saturday and the third will be a week from Wednesday. This was decided yesterday afternoon by Captains Dillingham and Baldwin, after a trip of inspection to the Moanalua grounds.

A careful inspection of the field showed that, while it was a great deal better than on Saturday, it was still so wet and slippery that it would be dangerous to play on Monday. The allowance of an extra day for it to dry off was therefore considered as good policy and the decision was quickly reached.

The Maui men are anxious to get into the game and feel that the quicker they can get into play the better their chances will be. They are being dined every night, and while this may be considered a part of polo to a certain extent, as such hospitality is bound to go with the "King of Sports," still it is hardly the very best thing which can happen to men who are sure to have hard games ahead of them before the week is out.

The usual arrangements will be made for the crowd which is expected, and even last night one of the local stables reported that every buggy and surrey in his establishment had been engaged for the occasion.

### IMMENSE CROWD WATCHES GAME

Secretary Atkinson Pitches  
First Ball in League  
at Aala Park.

The opening of the Kalaniana'ole Baseball League took place at Aala Park yesterday afternoon before one of the largest crowds which has ever come together in this city to see a ball game.
