NEW CHAMPIONS AT AALA PARK

Palamas Defeat Chinese After Long and Hard Game of Ball.

The final championship game between the Chinese Athletics and the Palamas, at Aala Park yesterday afternoon, will go into history as one of the hardest and most exciting ball games ever played here. The Chinese ball players were defeated 8-5, which gave the championship to the Palamas. About five or six thousand spectators of all nationalities, though mostly Chinese and Hawaiians, were present. The game was a battle between John Lo of the Chinese and Chas. Paaluhl of the Palamas. Paaluhl did some wonderful work in the box, which certainly entitles him to a chance in the senior league next season.

The battle began with the Chinese team taking the field amid the cheers of the thousands of Chinese present. Kekaha was the first at bat for the Palamas, and went out on a nice fly to Sing Chong at short. Walker got first on four balls. Kealoha sent a fly to Sing Chong, who let it drop, but managed to force out Walker at second. Paaluhl ended the inning by going out, Lo to first. In the second half of this inning, Paaluhl started by striking out both Sing Chong and W. Ayau. Lo made a safe hit to center-field, but Chi Bul closed the inning by going out, Paaluhl to Kama. H. Zerbe began the second inning by a grounder to Ayau at third, who made a bad throw to first. Kaahiwini flew to Mon Yin at right. Zerbe stole second. Kaopua hit to center-field and scored Zerbe. Both Hoopli and Kama flew out to Eng Sang at first. There was nothing doing for the Chinese in this inning.

In the third inning, Kekaha hit safe between short and second. Walker sent the ball into the stream and scored Kekaha. Kealoha made a three-bagger and sent Walker home. Paaluhl struck out. Kealoha made the second out by attempting to steal home. Zerbe went out from short to first. The Athletics were somewhat off in this inning and none managed to reach the initial bag. Paaluhl struck out two of the three batters and the third went out on a fly to Kaahiwini.

In both the fourth and fifth innings the Palamas failed to score. In the fourth inning, Lo struck out. Chi Bul was allowed to get to first on Kakaha's error. He stole second and went to third on a passed ball by Catcher Hoopli. E. Ayau hit safe over third. Chack went out, from Kaahiwini to Kama, but scored Chi Bul. Eng Sang was given a walk by Paaluhl. Ching went out, Kealoha to first.

The fifth inning was another lucky one for the Chinese nine, as Mon Yin, Sing Chong and W. Ayau each scored.

Here the Chinese started the crowd laughing by their yells in their mother tongue. In the sixth inning the Palamas did not get as far as first. Mon Yin scored for the Chinese Athletics. This made the score 5 to 3 in favor of the Chinese.

The seventh inning was most exciting. The Palamas filled the bases, but were prevented from scoring by the steady work of Lo in the box. In the seventh and eighth innings neither team scored.

The ninth was lucky for the Palamas, who scored five runs. During the start of this inning several Chinese were seen coming into the field with brooms and firecrackers, but were disappointed when they could not be made use of. Hoopli hit to short and got to second on a bad throw. Kama got to first on a hit over short. Kekaha was given a walk to first. Walker sent the ball between Ayau and Sing Chong and scored Hoopli. Kealoha was called out by Umpire Bert Bower on an infield hit. Paaluhl hit a two-bagger to center-field and scored Kama, Kekaha and Walker. Zerbe went out at first, but Paaluhl scored on the play. Kaahiwini went out, third to first. The Chinese boys made one run in this inning, ending the game by the score of 8 to 5 in favor of the Palamas.

It is said that the Palamas will celebrate their victory by a grand luau, at which the championship trophy of the Riverside League will be presented. Although losing the championship, the Chinese Athletics made the Palamas play ball, as five games were required to decide the honors.

Bliss, catcher of the Oakland team. Graduate of University of California. Drafted by St. Louis team for 1908.

Dashwood, catcher of Oakland team. Will catch here. A fast player and hard hitter.

Henley, pitcher of the San Francisco team. Led the Coast League pitchers this last season. Six feet three inches tall.

Burns, pitcher of Los Angeles team. His masterly pitching won the pennant for the Angels last season. Burns is a southpaw.

Nealon, first base. Regular first baseman of the Pittsburg National League team and a player with a National reputation.

Zelner, second base of the San Francisco team. A man noted for his fast fielding.

Devereaux, third baseman of the Oakland. One of the best known ball players in the States. A wonderful player and coacher.

Egan, shortstop of the Oakland team. Heaviest hitter in the Coast League today.

Hildebrand, left fielder of the Frisco team and the highest priced outfielder in the Coast League. A wonderful fielder and clever batter.

Williams, center field. Has been playing first base for the Frisco team this season. He is a graduate of the University of California.

Heitmuller, right fielder of Oakland team. Also a graduate of University of California. Largest man in the Coast League and a hard hitter.

Donahue, catcher of the Portland team. He will catch Joy in the coming series of games.

Joy, pitcher of the Frisco team. Drafted by the Boston National League team. Will pitch for All-Hawaii.

"Mique" Fisher, manager of the All Stars.

W. L. Baggerly, sporting editor of the S. F. Bulletin and without doubt the best known sporting writer on the Pacific coast.


