HAWAII TO SAIL TODAY

Local Yacht to Be Properly Sent Off on Her Long Cruise.

The transpacific yacht Hawaii will sail on her trip to San Pedro at 2 p. m. today from the foot of Fort street.

The band will be in attendance at the departure of the Hawaii this afternoon and it is expected that several of the local yachts will escort the cup-racer to Diamond Head.

According to latest Los Angeles advices the race will be started by no less a personage than President Roosevelt.

He has conferred with the Western Union Telegraph Company and found that he can get an open wire for five minutes across the continent and have a direct connection with the committee steamer anchored off Dead Man's Island.

The entries in the race, besides the Hawaii, will be: Lurline, the winner of the first transpacific race; Lady Maude, owned in San Diego; and Gwendolyn II, owned in Seattle.

The Lurline will represent Los Angeles in the race. The Angel City is kept on yachting just now and would like to see the transpacific contest made an annual affair.
