S. W. Keaweamahi Bequeaths Support to His Two Dogs.

Not all dogs are left to the tender mercies of the dog pound and Apana. By a will filed yesterday in the circuit court provision is made for two dogs to be fed for the rest of their natural lives.

The will of the late S. W. Keaweamahi was filed yesterday for probate by David Nahoolewa. The will is written in Hawaiian and after describing the property of the testator which consists principally of land on Emma street and some personal property, the testator proceeds to devise it in part to his cousin and the remainder to his brother on condition that he take care of and feed his two dogs.

Keaweamahi was seventy-two years old when he died and was well and widely known. At one time he was a policeman. He died June 28.

LAND DEEDS AND PATENTS.

Governor Frear yesterday issued the patent for the land of Upolu on the Island of Hawaii, thus consummating a deal made fifty-seven years ago as described in yesterday's Advertiser. The Governor also approved a deed for some land at Halawa, Molokai, from the Board of Education, and deeds for the exchange of lands at Olowalu, Maui. He also approved of the transfer from the Commissioner of Lands to the Department of Education of land at Punaahulu.

HONOKAA TRUST DEED.

The trust deed to secure the new issue of \$600,000 of Honokaa Sugar Company bonds has been filed with Registrar Merriam. The bonds are to bear six per cent and are to be in denominations of \$1000 each and are due in twenty-five years. They may be redeemed after ten years. The Bishop Trust Company is the trustee. The property conveyed is very carefully described. The bonds have just been listed on the Stock Exchange and will be called for the first time on Monday.

PARDON GRANTED.

Governor Frear yesterday granted a pardon to William Kauwahi. He was convicted a good many years ago for trying to pay his taxes by the expedient of forging a tax receipt. He served his term but desired restoration to civil rights.

A parole was also granted to Richard Andrews, a Hilo boy.
