MRS. DREIER HAS BEGUN HER SUIT

Seeks to Have Trust Deed to Cecil Brown Set Aside.

Suit was begun in the Circuit Court yesterday to set aside the trust deed made by August Dreier, shortly before his death, to Cecil Brown. Mrs. Emma Dreier, the widow, is the plaintiff and besides Cecil Brown she makes the children who were the principal beneficiaries under the will defendants. The bill is framed on the theory that the trust deed was made as a part of the transaction by which the deceased proposed to dispose of his estate after his death. As the widow was entitled to her dower in her husband's property, she claims to be entitled to her dower interest in the shares of stock of the August Dreier corporation which were transferred to Brown in trust and which represent a large part of the property in which the widow has a dower interest as she claims.

Applies for Guardianship
The mother of Jacob K., Maria, Hannah, Joseph, Oscar, and Mary Ann Holec has petitioned the circuit court to be appointed guardian of their estate. This consists of two pieces of property, one of which is rented to Chinese at \$75 a year, and the other to Japanese at \$95 a year. Judge De Bolt in connection with this petition entered a somewhat curious order. It recites that one of the minor children is an inmate of the Girls' Industrial School, and directs the Sheriff to bring her before the court at the time of hearing the case for the purpose of showing cause, if any she has, why the petition of her mother should not be granted.

To Take Testimony.
In the case of Hawaiian Carriage Manufacturing Company vs. Schuman Carriage Company, it has been stipulated that the testimony of W. W. Bruner shall be taken before Judge De Bolt on August 21 at ten o'clock. It is recited that Bruner is about to leave the Territory for an extended stay, and may not be back in time for the trial of the case. If he is not here, his testimony to be taken this week may be used in the trial.

Time Extended.
A stipulation was entered in the Circuit Court yesterday extending the time in which defendants might answer in the suit of William Paikuli vs. C. P. Iaukea and A. P. Taylor.

QUICK RESPONSE TO APPEAL FOR MONEY

The response made to the appeal for funds for the purchase of a moving picture projector for the Molokai settlement yesterday was prompt. In making the appeal this paper stated that half a day would be sufficient in which to raise, among the generous ones of Honolulu, the amount needed. The result justified the prediction. Before noon amounts ranging from fifty dollars to one dollar were handed in at this office until a total of \$181 was collected, as follows:

KAPAA CANE LANDS MAY BE OFFERED FOR LEASE

Col. Z. S. Spalding and Manager Geo. H. Fairchild were callers on Governor Frear yesterday, and the Kapaa lands were talked over. The government has not yet finally decided what it will do with the Kapaa cane lands but the town site lots of Kapaa are now about ready to be disposed of. There are 171 of them and above the cane lands there are eighty homesteads which are about ready to be disposed of. As to the cane lands, completed surveys are being made which are now nearly completed. There has been considerable inquiry in regard to these lands, and it is probable that they will be put up for lease at the appraised rentals as an upset. While Col. Spalding has declined to promise that he will bid the upset price, he has not said that he would not, and there are others interested.

HEMENWAY GOES TO WASHINGTON

Ten Cases in Which Territory Is Interested Are on Calendar.

There are ten cases before the United States Supreme Court in which the Territory of Hawaii is interested. Six of these are on the calendar for early hearing at the October term. Attorney General C. R. Hemenway expects to leave in September for Washington to represent the Territory in these cases. The cases are as follows: Rapid Transit vs. Holt, two cases, both tax appeal cases; Holt vs. Tullett, involving the right of the Territory to garnishee seamen's wages for taxes; In re Morito Kaizo, to determine whether Territorial courts had a right before the present law to naturalize aliens; Cotton Bros. vs. Territory involving the value of a dredger belonging to the Territory which was leased to Cotton Bros. and lost; McCandless vs. Carter, the celebrated Lanai case; Territory vs. Miguel, involving many features of the liquor license law; Territory vs. Rapid Transit, the Liliha street case; Territory vs. Puahi, and Territory vs. Kapiolani Estate involving the title to the crown lands. Besides these there is the John Marks habeas corpus case which has also been appealed to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. The Ewa tax appeal case and the Lahaialuna case, it is also said, will be taken to the Supreme Court of the United States.

SUZUKI TURNED DOWN.
A cable dispatch from the Attorney General of the United States was received yesterday instructing Clerk Murphy of the United States District Court to refuse Masakechi Suzuki's application for the completion of his naturalization. This is in accordance with the understanding of the law held here, but it was thought well, in a matter which might impinge on the foreign policy of the United States, to consult the Federal authorities. Suzuki may take further proceedings to test his right to citizenship.
