Rents of houses in Honolulu are generally going up and very few vacant ones can be procured.
Court Lunatic No. 6600, A. O. F., will meet in Pythian Hall, Harrison building, this evening at 7:30.
There will be initiatory work in Theodore Roosevelt Camp No. 1, U. S. W. V., in Waverley Hall at 7:30 this evening.
There were three fatal cases of tuberculosis during the first sixteen days of January, and no other deaths from contagious disease.


