HEAD OF ORDER OF EASTERN STAR WILL ARRIVE TODAY

Mrs. Ellis Simmons Washburn, the Most Worthy Grand Matron of the Order of the Eastern Star, with a party of six, will arrive this morning on the Alameda. This party will include Mrs. Jennie Matthews, a P. M. W. G. M.; Mrs. Ruth, P. G. M. of Iowa; Mrs. Krebs, P. G. M. of California; Mr. and Mrs. Williams and Miss Halsey of San

Jose, Cal. They will be here until the 23rd of March. Mrs. Washburn is the head of the Order of the Eastern Star which has more than 400,000 members in all parts of the world. This is the first time that a M. W. Grand Matron has left the mainland to visit a subordinate chapter, except once when a Grand Chapter was organized in Scotland.

LLOYD OSBOURNE, KNOWN HERE, SAYS HE'S PENNILESS

Chronicle. — Although Lloyd Osbourne, stepson of Robert Louis Stevenson, and of some prominence as a magazine writer, admits that he has not earned a cent from his writings during the past year, he thinks that his wife, Katharine, who he says has considerable artistic and literary ability, ought to be able to help support herself by her own efforts. Mrs. Osbourne brought suit for maintenance against her husband last July, and yesterday he filed his answer.

Mrs. Osbourne charged that her husband deserted her in October, 1901. She said he was earning \$500 a month from his writings and that he had personal property worth \$5000. She asked for an allowance from the court of \$300 a month for the support of herself and her two children, Alan, aged 11, and Louis Stevenson, aged 7.

Osbourne's answer is much more voluminous and throws some light on the relations between the two during the past few years. He starts in by denying that the children have been exclusively in his wife's possession or that she has supported them. For six years, he says, he has made her a monthly allowance, although she refused to let him have his share of the custody of the children. He denies that he deserted her in October, 1901, and alleges that on the contrary she left him in March, 1902. She filed a homestead on the house at 1100 Lombard street, which Osbourne says was his separate property and has since continued to live there. The rental value of the place he asserts to be \$150 a month and he has been informed, he declares, that she receives

\$200 a month from letting rooms in the house.

Instead of having \$5000 he says he has not a cent and his income from his writings, always a variable quantity, during the past year he declares to have been nil. He has been reduced to borrowing money from his mother, and his mother has even paid the \$75 a month to Mrs. Osbourne.

In addition to what he claims Mrs. Osbourne receives, he makes the allegation that his wife has considerable artistic and literary ability and that she is capable of earning an income from her efforts in that line.

He strenuously opposes her prayer to be allowed to have the custody of the children, asserting that he has been informed and believes that she has made no effort to have them educated or sent to school. He asks that at least the custody of the elder son, Alan, be intrusted to him, and says that he and his mother are ready and willing to support them. Edgar D. Peixotto and Joseph D. Redding are his attorneys and Sullivan and Theodore J. Roche represent Mrs. Osbourne.

The Osbournes' domestic difficulties have been a case of too much mother-in-law, according to the wife's stories. Mrs. Stevenson took an early dislike to her son's wife it is said, and Mrs. Osbourne has charged that the elder woman has done her best to endeavor to force her daughter-in-law to sue for divorce. Mrs. Stevenson has control of the purse strings of the family and has apparently had a strong influence over her son, particularly as regards his relations with his wife. Mrs. Osbourne at one time charged her mother-in-law with wishing to kidnap her children or one of them in order to have a lever with which to force her to sue for divorce.
