WOMEN TO AID CONSERVATION (Continued from Page One.) Mrs. Knudsen concluded by reading the following three letters from President Roosevelt, from James A. Garfield, Secretary of the Interior, and from F. H. Newell, head of the Reclamation Service.

"The White House, Washington, December 19, 1908.

"My Dear Mrs. Knudsen,—I am particularly glad that you came to Washington for the meeting of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, and the joint conference of the conservation of our natural resources. Will you take with you, on your return, my best greetings to the women of the Hawaiian Islands, and my heartiest wishes for their success in the good work they are undertaking. I especially wish you and them success in fullest measure in your efforts for the development of the Hawaiian Islands, and for conserving the water supply by protecting the forests. Your coming has brought the women of the Islands into closer contact with the women of the mainland, and that is one of its best results. Sincerely yours, THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

"To the Women of Hawaii.—Mrs. Knudsen, during her visit in this city at a time of several national congresses, devoted to the conservation and development of the country's resources, has not only expressed the interest Hawaii has in this movement, but fully understands its spirit, and is now returning with an enthusiastic desire that Hawaii shall do its full share.

"My Dear Mrs. Knudsen.—I wish to express my pleasure that it was possible for you to come to Washington from your far-distant home on Kauai to attend the conservation and other meetings held in Washington. The effect has been excellent in stimulating other women to take up the matter and in arousing a more general interest in the larger economic subjects. I trust that it will be practicable upon your return to get together some of the active women of the Islands and continue the discussion of these matters and maintain a continuous interest in affairs of national importance. From your very distance you have a certain advantage in keeping alive the activities here. Very truly yours, F. H. NEWELL, Director."

Governor Frear was the next speaker and he gave a very dramatic illustration of the necessity for work in the Islands by telling of the way in which Kahoolawe is almost denuded of vegetation and the soil being blown away by the wind until there is little but bare rock showing. Judge Dole said that women are needed in all public movements and that they could be of real use in this one by keeping the object of it before their friends. He also spoke on the subject of local harbors and what a benefit improvements in this respect would be. "Women," said he, "are especially interested in this subject, particularly those who live on the other islands for they naturally like to land at a wharf and not have to be taken ashore in a small boat through the breakers."

R. S. Hosmer outlined the work that is being done by his department and told of the immense improvements that could be made with a larger appropriation. He said that to accomplish the objects of the congress, intense enthusiasm was needed and he believed that the women would be of the greatest help in rousing such enthusiasm. Bishop Restarick drew attention to a very pleasing point of view of the conservation movement. Said he, "When I see so many women interested in this movement I am assured that there is nothing political about it and that the work that is being done will be free from any taint that might besmirch a political movement."

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Ex-Governor Carter said that a very important matter was the government hydrographic survey which should have sufficient appropriation to keep its work up-to-date all the time. This work is of the greatest importance in obviating the stealing of water rights by corporations and preserving the natural sources to the country.

After the meeting a call was made for entries to the local Conservation Association at a nominal annual fee. There was a long list of names to prove the enthusiasm started by Mrs. Knudsen's work by the time the guests had said goodbye to Mrs. Frear and thanked her and Mrs. Knudsen for a meeting as entertaining as it was instructive and effective.

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
