

Owing to the necessity of knowing how many people are going on the big excursion to Pearl Harbor on May 9, in order to provide the proper amount of lunch, it has been decided to close the sale of tickets at two o'clock next Saturday afternoon. This will enable Captain Neely, who is in charge of the commissariat, to enter accordingly.
