Hawaii Chapter No. 1, Order of Kamehameha, will meet in Fraternity Hall, Odd Fellows' building, at 7:30 this evening.

Hawaiian Commercial will pay an extra dividend of fifty cents a share next month, making a total dividend per share of seventy-five cents, according to the present prospects.

The liner Makura of the Canadian-Australian company is expected to make a record run this trip so that she will arrive at Victoria in time to take a big excursion party from that city to Seattle.

A handsome carved chair made from koa is on exhibition at the Promotion Committee rooms, the work of Otremba, the wood-carver. This is to be sent to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

Lumber for the replanking of Hackfeld wharf is due here on the American-Hawaiian steamer Pleiades from Puget Sound the latter part of this week. Work will be started as soon as possible.

Army and Navy people were much in evidence at the excellent dance given last evening at the Moana Hotel. There were many people in attendance from the transport Logan, and also a large number of townfolk.

King street, from Alapai to Kecaumoku, is half-blockaded, one side of the street being entirely shut off from general traffic. Considerable improvement work has been going on of late, which has made this action necessary.

Will J. Cooper, who has been doing excellent work with the Hawaii Promotion Committee, has been selected by that body to conduct a newspaper-booming Hawaii at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition. Mr. Cooper will leave on the transport Dix for the Northwest.

It is rumored that Dr. Walter R. Brinckerhoff will shortly resign his Federal position here. He was sent to the Islands to make a thorough study of the disease of leprosy and also to have charge of the construction of the Federal Leprosarium on Molokai. Dr. Brinckerhoff does not deny the rumor.
