Mail is due from the mainland on the Pacific Mail liner Mongolia Tuesday morning.

The Kamehameha cadets will hold a dress parade on the school grounds this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Mrs. James Guild, upon whom an operation was performed at Miss Johnson's Sanatorium last week, is rapidly improving.

There will be a special meeting of the Kaahumanu Improvement Club on Monday evening at 7:30. All members are earnestly requested to attend.

The Hilo Tribune says that some Hawaiians have made a gold strike in "Nevada," the locations being near Grass Valley and Nevada City. Both places are in California.

The Waialae, Kaimuki and Palolo Improvement Club held a meeting Friday night, when it was reported that the Honolulu Gas Company had decided to extend its pipelines to Kaimuki.

It is rumored that J. H. Craig, formerly a member of the Territorial Board of Immigration, will be appointed to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Norman Watkins on the Board of License Commissioners.

The annual meeting of the congregation of St. Clement's church will take place in the parish house on Tuesday next at 8 o'clock. All members of this congregation, both men and women, are requested to be present.

ended, and they have dropped, in common with the quotations on beets. The reports dealing with the Cuban situation state that the rains that have occurred recently throughout the island will work considerable harm to the present crop, but will be of great benefit to the next one. Improved financial conditions in the island republic, and the adoption of the most modern methods in sugar mill machinery, will also be reckoned as factors in the conditions that can be included in crop prospects. Against these roseate reports, however, comes the announcement that the new government is rapidly organizing a standing army of considerable proportions—which means the existence of a revolutionary weapon that does not long remain idle in a Latin-American country.



and much will depend upon the nature of the recommendations that Mr. Gartley makes in his report on the conditions surrounding the operation of the automatic system as he finds it on the mainland. It is said that the system has been applied with great success in Los Angeles and vicinity. The requirements of telephonic service there are considerably more exacting than they would be in Honolulu, by reason of the greater population, and it is pointed out that the experience of Los Angeles is sufficient basis for a definite and conclusive understanding of just what can be expected from the new device.

Some New Tariff Ideas.

The administrative customs act that is incorporated in the new tariff, is going to vest the President of the United States with far-reaching powers, and would seem to be in opposition to the argument that is advanced against the centralization of power, of which former Vice President Fairbanks is an uncompromising opponent. There are fundamental differences in the methods as included in the Payne bill, and the ideas expressed by Senator Aldrich. The Payne bill plans to automatically impose the tariff rates at the maximum figure upon countries that discriminate against the exported products of the United States. The main objection that has been advanced to this is that its provisions are not clear enough to assure its enforcement. The Aldrich idea would be to provide that minimum rates shall be in operation from a period of from nine to twelve months. In the interval the President would be empowered to enter into negotiations with foreign governments with the object of securing concessions which would make the imposition of the maximum rates in the United States tariff unnecessary. If this idea is carried out it would place a large amount of executive discretion in the hands of the President. The plan is particularly interesting to the business world because of the fact that it indicates a restoration of "normal feeling" between Congress and the Chief Executive.

Relaying Wireless to Coast.

Those who are interested in the commercial development of the wireless telegraph are anxious to learn the fate of the message that was sent to the Alameda two days out, to be relayed by the wireless plant on that vessel to San Francisco. The plan of relaying to the Pacific Coast via the Alameda was carried out as a measure of economy, and the sender of the message stated that the cost of forwarding it in that form was materially less than the regular cable tolls. The delay of two days was not a hindrance in this particular case, and if the message reaches its destination on time it will establish a precedent that is likely to be followed when speed of transmission is not an absolute necessity.
