JUSTICE PERRY TAKES HIS SEAT

Mr. Fairbanks Has Praise for the Judiciary of Hawaii.

Antonio Perry had a rather auspicious induction into office yesterday as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Hawaii, succeeding to the place vacated by the resignation of Sidney M. Ballou. In response to a telegram that was received from Attorney General Wickersham, informing Perry of his confirmation by the United States Senate, he took the oath of office to support the Constitution of the United States and administer even-handed justice to "rich and poor."

In company with Governor Frear, ex-Vice President Fairbanks entered the courtroom shortly before Justice Perry took the oath of office, and was present during the proceedings. Following the signing of the written oath by Justice Perry, Chief Justice Hartwell said: "I notice the presence of our distinguished visitor—I wish he were not merely a visitor—Mr. Charles W. Fairbanks, and Governor Frear. Mr. Fairbanks, will you allow me to present you with a copy of Volume 13 of the Hawaiian Reports, for light reading on your sea voyage? Nothing, I think, gives a better idea of the character of the country than the nature of its judicial decisions. I think that you will find that the decisions of this court are remarkably free from technicalities and that the arguments of attorneys before the court are free from frivolities and trivialities."

The ex-Vice President showed plainly enough that he was very glad to receive the latest volume of the Hawaiian Reports for "light reading" on his journey, and after accepting the volume from the hands of the Chief Justice, he said: "Chief Justice and Associate Justices: I thank you for this mark of courtesy. The judicial institutions of Hawaii have already made a favorable impression upon me, and I am not a stranger to courts of justice. I desire to congratulate the court and wish you the best of success."

The Supreme Court then proceeded with its business, delayed by the tardiness of Perry's confirmation. The first case heard was that of James B. Castle on a petition to register title of land on an appeal from the Court of Land Registration. The case was argued and submitted, E. C. Peters appearing for the petitioner, the appellant, and J. W. Cathcart for Helen Boyd, the appellee. The other case argued before the Supreme Court yesterday was that of Mary A. Richards against Carl Ontal et al., on exceptions from the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, E. C. Peters and Smith & Lewis being the attorneys for the plaintiff-appellant, and J. A. Magoon for the defendant. The argument was begun at the morning session of the court and concluded at the afternoon.

The case of Alexander Lazarus against Lena Rosewarne et al, on an appeal from the Circuit Court, is set for this morning. W. C. Achi is appearing for the appellant, the plaintiff and Kinney, Marx, Prosser and Anderson for the defendant.

Motion is Denied. The libel case of J. W. Cathcart against the Hawaiian Gazette Company and Walter G. Smith, was called in Judge De Bolt's department of the Circuit Court yesterday for hearing on a motion of the plaintiff, asking that the trial of the case be set for a day certain.

Attorney W. A. Kinney of the firm of Kinney, Marx, Prosser and Anderson, objected to the forcing the case to trial in place of its regular position on the calendar, declaring that he had planned for an extended vacation on the belief that the case would be allowed to come up in its regular order. He said that while the defendants were ready for an immediate trial, as a matter of personal convenience he objected to the motion of the plaintiff. Attorney Kinney emphasized the fact that all the evidence of the defense was in his hands and that the defendants had no desire to prevent the case coming up for an early hearing.

Notes of the Courts. Ah On was sentenced to five years at hard labor by Judge De Bolt yesterday upon his plea of guilty to a charge of larceny in the first degree. There were two indictments against Ah On, his plea of guilty being to the true bill charging him with the theft of a horse valued at \$140 from a countryman, Dan Chan. A nolle prosequi was entered to the second indictment.

A default judgment was entered in Judge De Bolt's court yesterday in the case of John Neill, administrator of the will of James H. O'Neill against Richard L. Gilliland, James Bicknell, Auditor of the City and County of Honolulu. The action was brought on a promissory note of \$100 and, in addition, the judgment allows \$47.75 as interest from June 17, 1903, and costs of \$35.20.

A petition for allowance of accounts and final discharge was filed yesterday by the Hawaiian Trust Company on the estate of Flora Dexter of Papeete, Tahiti.

A joinder in demurrer was filed yesterday by W. E. Shaw in his suit against John P. Culburn, as executor of the estate of the late Prince David. His attorneys, Atkinson and Quarles, defend the sufficiency of the complaint and also filed a motion that the hearing on the demurrer be set for a day certain.

Justice De Bolt yesterday denied the motion of Harry T. Mills for a new trial in his suit against Isaac Coekett, in which judgment was entered for the defendant.

NEW RULES FOR HEALTH SERVICE

Changes Are Made Necessary to Meet the New Laws.

New regulations are being drafted for the Territorial Health Department by President Mott-Smith, a number of changes having been found necessary by reason of the laws enacted by the last Legislature. The work has been undertaken in a systematic manner, but will require considerable time and attention before it is finally completed.

The most important problem that confronts the Health Department at the present time is the completion of preparations for the enforcement of the new leprosy law, and this is also being pursued in a manner that will set the machinery in motion without undue loss of time. The new leprosy statute is liberal in its provisions, particularly by reason of the clause relating to preliminary treatment at the Kalaheo Receiving Station. In addition to its liberality, however, it possesses the equally important requisite of effectiveness, and in order to cast enlightenment on its provisions and intent, the law will be published in its entirety in both the English and Hawaiian languages, for general distribution. In conjunction, a pamphlet will be prepared explaining the purpose of the law and emphasizing the necessity for its enforcement, the pamphlet to be also distributed to the general public.

Policy of Publicity. By this method of publicity and explanation, President Mott-Smith hopes to enlighten people throughout the Territory as to what the government wishes to do. As all government physicians are agents of the Board of Health, in the enforcement of the law, no difficulty is apprehended in this respect.

President Mott-Smith is also drafting a new series of forms for the registration of vital statistics, in conformity with the recommendation of the Bureau of Census of the United States Government. The Census Bureau has expressed a desire for general uniformity in the vital records throughout the States and Territories, and the Board of Health will make the new records conform as nearly as possible with the ideas of the Federal department, although certain changes will be necessary to meet local conditions.

A discontinuance was filed yesterday by Castle and Withington in the case of the Western and Hawaiian Investment Company, Ltd., against Kapena Richards.

The appeal from the District Court by Lu Fat, charged with assault and battery, was withdrawn yesterday, the defendant paying the fine imposed of \$20.00 and the costs of \$3.70.
