NEW PARK MAY GET BLEACHERS

At a meeting of the big league yesterday afternoon it was decided to allow the trustees to go ahead and sell out the fixings of the ball park to the highest bidder. This is the knell of league baseball for some time to come, unless by any chance the league gets together and plays on the new ground. This selling off should prove duck soup for the promoters of the new ground who will get a ready-made set of bleachers for very much less than cost and will be able to take them to the new ground at a small expense.

The new ground is going ahead at a fast rate and the management states that it will be ready to open on July 11. Just what teams will play then is hardly known. There is talk of a new minor league in the afternoon papers, but the promoters are not relying on this as much of a drawing card.

The suggestion may be implied that the big league might get together for a short series beginning in July. Nothing better could happen for baseball here. A short, snappy series with all the players keyed up to the best kind of ball, would make a great hit and the location of the new ground would be an immense advantage.

CRICKET GAME WITH SAILORS

There will be a great game of cricket at Makiki field tomorrow afternoon. The Honolulu C. C. will play a team combined from the sailors from the British steamer Yeddo and the ditto ship Glenholm. The steamer boys wanted to play a match but found that they could get only seven players away from duty at one time, so they have combined with the wind-jammers, who will put in four men.

The combination is going to be a hard one to beat as any British vessel has some good cricketers aboard and, when you combine a team from two of them you may be sure that you have something hard to go against. The game will start at 2 o'clock and it is hoped that the local players will turn out in full force.

DRAGONLETS WILL DECIDE

The C. A. C. will have a very important meeting tonight. It will be at the Chinese Y. M. C. A. and every member of the team is requested to show up. The occasion is the report of President Goo Kim after his confab with the Riverside league.

It will be decided tonight whether the dragonlets will stay by the Riverside league or go out and join some other league. The pros and cons of the situation have been properly hashed and now it remains only for the C. A. C. to take a vote and decide the matter.

HALL CUP FOR KAHULUI RACE

A handsome cup has been put up by Hall & Son for the first prize in the race to Kahului and return. This prize will go to the yacht that covers the entire course of the race in the fastest time. In addition to this there will be a prize for the second yacht to finish and also a prize put up by the yachtsmen of Maui for the yacht that makes the best time from Honolulu to Kahului.

Secretary Neely of the yacht club has written to Mr. Williams of Kahului stating that the yachts expect to arrive off that port some time near midday on Saturday, June 12. He asked that a judge be appointed to take the time of the yachts as they round the mark and that a mark be placed in a convenient place for rounding.

In case of the yachts arriving off Kahului during dark, Mr. Neely asked that a light be arranged for, to show on the mark and asked that Mr. Williams state whether, in such a case, the skippers would be expected to take their own time or not.

The Maunese yachtsmen were also informed that the Hawaii and the other yachts would be open to inspection all day Sunday and the Honolulu yachtsmen would not look for any entertainment on Saturday, after a day and night of strenuous sailing, their bunks being probably more welcome in the early evening.

There is a possibility that the Charlotte C. will make the trip to Kahului but not as one of the racers. This fast little yawl is easily able to make the trip but would find it a trifle strenuous cracking on all sail for a race up the channel to windward, should the trade winds be blowing hard.

OPEN GUN CLUB SHOOT SUNDAY

The Hawaiian gun club will hold its eleventh semiannual open shoot next Sunday starting at 9 a. m. on the Ka-kaoka traps. This is one of the most attractive sporting events in Honolulu and always draws a large crowd of clay pigeons as well as a bunch of spectators.

A program has been arranged with seven events of which four are free for all. There will be a medal given for the highest average during the day and there will be a lunch served at the clubhouse. Shells may be had at the grounds.

Sport Notes

The Ringers are becoming sassy. MAN FRIDAY IN COOPER RACE

The Cooper cup race on Sunday for small yachts, inside Pearl Harbor, is getting the skippers of the smaller craft all up to windward with their helms aweather.

There was another entry in the race made yesterday. Tommy King will sail the sloop Man Friday, the use of which he has recently acquired and he states that he expects to sail rings round the whole bunch—if they drop their anchors.

The other skippers all agreed to have the friend of Robinson Crusoe enter the race with the same handicap as the Malolo. This will make six entries in the race and a very pretty struggle is sure to be the result.

The entries with handicaps are: Defiance, scratch; Maggie, 8 mins.; Dagmar, 15 mins.; Malolo, Chip and Man Friday, 20 mins. each.

The Hawaii II. will leave Honolulu harbor at the mystic hour of 7:30 a. m. on Sunday morning in order to be down at the yacht clubhouse in plenty of time for the start. Those who figure on going on her should set the alarm clock so that it will ring before breakfast time. Note, all hands must shave before coming aboard. 'Vast snoring and tumble out early.

Vice Commodore Jaeger will take a party down in his launch and has kindly offered to see to setting the race mark. This is the only mark that has to be set as all the others are regular channel buoys or stakes.

The race will start at 10 a. m. which will allow just enough time for those who wish to see the start to get to the clubhouse via the 9:15 a. m. train from the O. R. and L. depot.


