



WOMEN LEFT OUT OF BALDWIN HOME PROJECT

It turns out that H. P. Baldwin's projected Home for the Aged is intended for men only, so it will be necessary to revive the Honolulu project and build a home for indigent white women. There are many such unfortunate in Honolulu and the care of some of them has greatly taxed Miss Yarow and other Christian workers. The matter of building the new home here is interesting Bishop Restarick and Rev. Mr. Osborne, though it is not the plan to make the work denominational.

Justice Clark, of the Supreme Court, sitting in Rochester, recently had a word or two to say for people who go about public highways on foot. Addressing the grand jury, he declared:

"The automobile is an institution which has come to stay. But the pedestrian was here first. He has certain defined rights. One of these is that he must be protected in traveling on the public highways. Careless, reckless and criminal operation of automobiles must be stopped."

Once during the argument in a lawsuit, in which Lincoln represented one party, the lawyer on the other side was a good deal of a glib talker, but not reckoned as deeply profound or much of a thinker. He would say anything to a jury which happened to enter his head. Lincoln, in his address to the jury, referring to this, said: "My friend on the other side is all right, or would be all right, were it not for the peculiarity I'm about to chronicle. His habit—of which you have witnessed a very painful specimen in his argument to you in this case—of reckless assertion and statements without grounds, need not be imputed to him as a moral fault or as telling of a moral blemish. He can't help it. For reasons which, gentlemen of the jury, you and I have not time to study here, as deplorable as they are surprising, the oratory of the gentleman completely suspends all action of his mind. The moment he begins to talk, his mental operations cease. I never knew of but one thing which compared with my friend in this particular. That was a small steamer boat. Back in the days when I performed my part as a keel boatman, I made the acquaintance of a trifling little steamboat which used to bustle and puff and wheeze about in Sangamon river. It had a five-foot boiler and a seven-foot whistle, and every time it whistled it stopped."
