ONE STRIKER IS ARRAIGNED

Continuance in Case of Man Charged With an Assault.

There was only one case growing out of the strike situation that was called in the Circuit Court yesterday. Sugawara, the Japanese charged with assault and battery on the person of H. Mumata, a fellowcountryman who did not wish to contribute to the fund for the benefit of Makino et al, was arraigned and a continuance granted. The Japanese was without counsel, even the faithful Lightfoot failing to appear in behalf of the accused. Sugawara indicated a desire for an early hearing, but it was apparent that he could not fully comprehend the nature of the proceedings even with the assistance of an interpreter. Judge Whitney finally granted a continuance, and it is probable that in the interval an indictment will be found against the man by the Grand Jury.

Demurs to Complaint. A demurrer was filed yesterday by C. W. Ashford, as attorney for John F. Colburn, to the complaint of Henry May & Company, Ltd., in a suit over a promissory note. The demurrer states that no copies of the promissory notes were incorporated in the complaint. Summons was issued yesterday in the divorce case of Kahaku Hoe against Kawakoihoi Hoe. The only allegation in the complaint is that the libelee is confined at the Settlement. Alice Gay Andrews has been granted a divorce from Charles Andrews on the ground of non support. E. C. Peters is attorney for Mrs. Andrews. George Davis has been appointed the next friend of Abraham Keaulana, a minor and complainant with his brother, John, in an ejectment suit brought against Ben Poepeo, Annie Poepeo, Hattie Keaulana and Kamaehoa.

AMUSEMENTS

In connection with the inclusion of Schumann's immortal "Two Grenadiers" among the program items for Mr. Bennett upon the visit of the Withers Concert Company to Honolulu an interesting little story is told, illustrative of the singer's versatility. It was at Batavia, Java, and for the third concert this song was among Mr. Bennett's numbers. The "Stafmuzeik" was assisting that evening, and a rehearsal had been called for six in the morning—they are early risers in Java. At 11:30 the night before Bandmaster Gerharz called on the artists. He wanted to know why Mr. Bennett did not sing that number at least with full orchestral accompaniment. "Oh, have you the parts?" inquired the baritone, eagerly. The bandmaster had not. Haven't you?" he inquired. "Why, no," was the reply—and then, with scarcely a second's pause: "But I can orchestrate it in time." There are sixty odd instruments in the "Stafmuzeik," but at six in the morning Mr. Bennett presented himself for rehearsal—with all the parts ready. Seats are on sale for the next two concerts, Friday, June 18, and Tuesday, June 22, at Bergstrom Music Co.

Marshall Darrach. The first of the Marshall Darrach entertainments will be given at the Alexander Young Hotel on June 21. The recital will be Twelfth Night. Of the Darrach rendition of this comedy a Portland, Me., paper says: Mr. Darrach chose well for his first recital in Portland. With the single exception of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," the lively comedy, "Twelfth Night, or What You Will," best serves to reveal the master in his lighter mood—that lighter mood which he puts away forever after the performance of the play in Middle Temple hall in 1601, during the Christmas festivities which probably gave it its almost significant irrelevant name. It was indeed, "What You Will."

The reader, a remarkably young man—probably not much over 35 years, gave a recital of the comedy which very well deserves the expressions of favor which it won. His omissions, decidedly free on account of the hour (11 in the morning), were made with considerable good sense and tactful regard for the dramatic requirements, while some of his original comments with which the elisions were filled in were of themselves worth hearing. Possibly no other comedy requires greater breadth of expression than "Twelfth Night," the comic strain which permeates it giving the characters so sharp an individuality that only talent of a very unusual quality will compass them all in one man's mouth to the intelligent appreciation of an audience which does not carry its textbooks in its hands. It is a very long way from the demure darning of the mock sennario to the full-throated bluster of Sir Toby Belch. Mr. Darrach proved equal to the task and was fully rewarded by his audience. The audience itself was noteworthy, more than filling the card room of the Falmouth. It is to be regretted that Mr. Darrach is not to open the course in literature at Yale with a lecture-reading on Shakespeare and his work.
