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ARMY AND NAVY NEWS

Sometime this forenoon the United States protected cruiser St. Louis will arrive from San Francisco and will make a stay of at least a week in this port before proceeding to Samoa. She will be berthed at the Oceanic dock owing to the naval docks being occupied by the Japanese cruisers Aso and Soya. She will coal here, taking on a sufficient supply for the round trip to Pago Pago.

Railway to Fort Ruger.

Among the improvements which will be added to the Kaimuki-Waialae district through the agency of the establishment of Fort Ruger at Diamond Head, will be the extension of the Rapid Transit system from Waialae road to the military reservation. Just what route will be used is not certain yet.

Officers Going Away.

On the army transport leaving here about July 4 for the mainland will be Captain Seales, Fifth Cavalry, and Captain Chapman, Captain Shipp and Lieutenant Pardee, 20th Infantry, who will participate in the big army rifle competition. Lieut. Pardee is one of the best shots in the army. On dress occasions the breast of his uniform fairly glitters with medals and trophies won by splendid revolver and rifle work.

Major Goode Transferred.

Major Goode, who was recently promoted from a captaincy and assigned to the command of a squadron of the Fifth Cavalry at Leilehua, has been transferred to the 11th Cavalry which is stationed at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga.

Japanese Band at Moana.

On Sunday evening the Japanese band of Admiral Ijichi's flagship will give a concert at the Moana Hotel in the little park bordering on the shore. The Japanese band is a fine organization and its renditions of standard and classical music compares favorably with many of the foreign military bands. The concert will be from 8 to 10 p. m.

Army Capes and Hats.

Consideration has been given by the general staff of the army to the issue of the slicker, in place of the poncho to all troops. Reports have been received from commanding officers of artillery districts and of regiments of infantry, cavalry and field artillery on the relative advantages, according to their observation and experience with those two articles. The preference is expressed for the slicker as permitting greater freedom of movement as compared with the poncho. The objection to the latter is that, being of rubber, it is apt to crack when folded, besides being costly and not durable. It has been decided to submit to the infantry equipment board, in session at Rock Island, the poncho, the slicker and a combination cape and shelter tent invented by Lieut. Charles H. Mason, 19th Infantry, for examination and practical test. It is desired to obtain a recommendation of a suitable garment which will serve the purposes of the poncho or slicker. The reports which have been made on the subject will be forwarded to Rock Island with the poncho. There has also been sent to Rock Island the new campaign hat as tentatively adopted by the general staff. This hat is somewhat lower in the crown and stiffer in the brim than the present article of headgear. The instructions to the Rock Island board are that the new hat shall be critically examined in comparison with the service hat, the latter worn with the Alpine crease and the Montana peak. The new hat, on account of its low crown, may not be "creased" or "peaked," but will probably be worn with four dents in the crown, after the manner of the hats worn by the northwestern mounted police.

Heavier Bullet for the Army.

Experimental ammunition has been made by the ordnance department of the army for tests, with a view to ascertaining if it is advisable to adopt a heavier projectile for the musket. The ammunition has been sent to the Springfield armory and the school of musketry for the firings. The present bullet weighs 150 grains. The experimental ammunition includes bullets weighing 160 grains, 170 grains, 180 grains and 190 grains. It is appreciated that the heavier bullets will be subject to less deviation on account of wind influences. On the other hand, with the present powder charge, which gives a pressure of 52,000 pounds per square inch, the heavier bullet the greater will be the arc of flight. The lighter bullet, therefore, has a flatter trajectory and a greater danger area. If the weight of the bullet is changed a great amount of work will be involved in readjusting gun sights and computing new range tables.

Movement of Troops.

Orders have been issued by the War Department for Company C, Hospital Corps, commanded by Capt. Robert U. Paterson of the Medical Corps, at the Walter Reed General Hospital, Takoma Park, D. C., to proceed to Fort Niagara, N. Y., for station.

Others orders are for the 3rd United States Infantry to embark on the transport Buford at Seattle, Wash., about August 5, for Manila, P. I., and for the 105th and 159th companies of Coast Artillery to take passage on the same steamer for Honolulu, H. I.

Troop M, 8th Cavalry, at Fort D. A. Russell, Wyo., has been ordered to march to Fort Robinson, Neb., for station.

Naval Baseball Trophy.

At the suggestion of the commander-in-chief of the Atlantic battleship fleet, the Navy Department has decided to present to the United States National Museum in this city the handsome gold cup won by the baseball team of the battleship Kentucky at Amoy, China, while a portion of the fleet was there on the trip around the world. The cup is highly decorated and is typical of Chinese art. It is valued at about \$1,250. It was deemed inadvisable to retain the valuable cup in the fleet and the suggestion that it be placed in the National Museum was approved by Secretary Meyer. In that institution it will serve as a record of the Kentucky's baseball team and a memento of the cruise of the fleet around the world.

Small Warships at Champlain.

Uncle Sam's baby torpedo boat, the Manly, will be the flagship of the Lake Champlain boat expedition, as the Navy Department has designated the squadron of three little vessels which will represent the navy at the Lake Champlain tercentenary ceremonies to be held on the lake July 5 to 9. The little Manly, which is being used at Annapolis, will go to New York, where she will be joined by two large-sized steam launches at the New York navy yard. The three little vessels will proceed up the Hudson and through the canals to Lake Champlain. After the ceremonies the Manly will return to Annapolis and the launches to New York. The little Manly was purchased during the Spanish war. She is of only thirty tons displacement and measures 60 feet 8 inches in length, 9 feet 5 inches in breadth and 2 feet 11 inches mean draft. Ten men will form her crew and Ensign B. H. Steere will have command.
