



HILO EXODUS STARTS TODAY

Ayres, Jackson and Fahy Leave for Hawaii to Bring the Laurels Back.

The big exodus for Hilo will start today. A bunch of live ones will leave on the Mauna Kea and will be followed by many more good sportsmen later in the week. Everything is arranged for a record good time at the city where they build breakwaters. Official information comes that the weather bureau has ordered the sunniest weather to last from Friday till Tuesday and everybody who has time, money and sense enough to go to Hilo, will have one great time.

There will be a party of three notables aboard the good steamer today. H. M. Ayres, scheduled to show the Hilo boys how to walk a mile. Nigel Jackson, the Marathon kid who expects to win the race from Nine Mile, and Dal Fahy, the wakenphast, who will, like Jackson, appear in both the Marathon and walking events.

The local interest really centers in the Marathon and walking events as these will have Oahu representatives that are expected to carry back the honors with them. The long race will be on Saturday afternoon and the walking race will be on Monday.

It is not known just what athletic talent they have on Hawaii, but after the showing that both Fahy and Jackson have made here, it seems very probable that one of them will win the Marathon race while both of them will be in the mile-walking race as well as Ayres and one of the three should be able to hand it to the good Hawaii athletes.

Great Horse Races.

The horse races are going to be the best ever. All the thirty-two stalls are full and the Japanese horses are being housed under the grandstand. The big event, the Merchants' Stakes will be run on Monday, July 5. The distance is 1 1/4 miles and there will be four entries.

The four entries are all fast ones. There is Johnnie O'Rourke's Banonica, the filly that won the same race last January. Drollett will be up on a he is the kid that rides a grand race. Then there is Louie Warren's Warning with Domingo Ferreira up. The Kukaianu ranch entry, Major Collier, and Weber, the Coast horse entered by Colin McLennon.

Warning Is Favorite.

Inside information from Hilo states that Warning is expected to win the race. This is taken as much from the expert clocking, that has been done, as from the dope. It seems, according to what has been written by correspondents of local sportsmen, that both the clocking and the dope conform and that Warning will be an odds on favorite at the post.

The next most interesting event on the race program is probably the Monday event of six furlongs for Hawaiian bred maidens. There is absolutely no dope on which to base any forecast of the race and the consequence is that each of the four entries has a money backing that will spend all its money to say that the home horse will win.

A maiden event of this kind is always a very keen one. The ranch that enters a horse for the race always has some hundreds of employees who are ready to back their own animal to the limit and the maiden colt or filly, that comes in first, will pack a heavy load of dough for the lucky people who happen to be workers or partisans of the ranch that enters it.

Some Keen Soccer.

The soccer game will be on Monday. This will give the visiting players a chance to get over any seasickness that they may suffer and to take a nice rest and be properly ready for the great game. Eddie Fernandez has a live bunch working with him and, under the leadership of that veteran player, Jack Cotton, we may feel assured that the Honolulu dribblers will come back with the cup. Even though they lose, we may be sure that they will put up the game of their lives and make the Hiloites work some to find their goal.

Jackson Subpoenaed.

Nigel Jackson was served with a subpoena yesterday in which he was commanded to appear in court this morning and give evidence in a case. But it is unofficially understood that the examining lawyers and the court will do their best to get through with him before 11.30 so that he may make a run for the Inter-Island wharf and get aboard the Mauna Kea before she leaves port. Jackson wishes it stated that he is

in the very best of lively trim. He says that he never felt better in all his life and he is confident of coming back with the Marathon wreath on his brow. Jackson has made good his promises in the past and Honolulu has no need to feel anything but proud of the champion runner that is going to defend the honor of this Island.

ENTIRE PROGRAM FOR NEXT SATURDAY IS ARRANGED

Joe Cohen Has Three Great Preliminaries Fixed for Cordell-Sullivan Go on Saturday.

Program for Next Saturday, July 3.

Cordell vs. Dick Sullivan, 15 rounds for middleweight championship of the Pacific. Including Pacific Coast, Hawaiian Islands and the Orient.

Soldier McCollough of Fort Shafter vs. Wahilani, 6 rounds at 140 pounds for welterweight championship of the Hawaiian Islands and the Orient.

Bugler Sarconi of Camp Very vs. Fernandez, 6 rounds at 125 pounds for the lightweight championship of the Hawaiian Islands.

Miller of Fort Shafter vs. "Limey" Richards of Camp Very, 4 rounds at 160 pounds for the light heavyweight championship of the Hawaiian Islands.

The above is the program arranged by Joe Cohen for the big event at the Orpheum next Saturday night and it makes a noise like being the very best that has ever been produced here. The main event is properly for the Pacific championship in the middleweight class as both men have beaten everything that came their way on the Coast and Dick Sullivan is doubly the Hawaiian Island champion as he has always beaten everybody here.

The St. Louis cannot provide material for any preliminaries as it is very probable that she will not be here on July 3, but may go to Hilo. This has not yet been decided, but it is unlikely that there will be any changes made even should she stay, as Joe rightly figures that he has arranged a bumper card to improve which would be a hard task.

McCollough a Favorite.

The appearance of McCollough with Wahilani will be a great treat for the fans. The soldier is a local favorite on account of his sterling game and Wahilani is a lad of great speed and cleverness, with the Hawaiian fans to back him and make even in the betting with the sturdy Irishman.

McCollough is something of a puzzle. He never works out very hard before a bout. He seems to be afraid of getting his muscles sore or of having some part of his hitting apparatus put out of commission beforehand. But, when he gets in the ring, it is all off. He goes in for all he is worth and eats punishment so fast that, if it were only pie he were contending with, he could carry off the prize at any pie-eating contest in the world.

Bugler Has Made Good.

Young Sarconi, the bugler from the Marine corps, made a hit with the fans at his last appearance. He went on in a preliminary with Nigel Jackson, the great Marathon runner, and made the wiry athlete back up once or twice. The Fernandez whom he is scheduled to meet is a protégé of Joe Leal and is said by the energetic chief of detectives to be a wonder.

The Portuguese fans will be out to give their champion a royal welcome and plenty of noisy encouragement, while Sarconi will have the backing of the Marines and the sons of sunny Italy. At 125 pounds both men will be at their very best and a rattling good go will be the result of their meeting.

Dick Likes Miller.

Miller is the big road-pounder who is so well liked by Dick Sullivan as a sparring partner. There will be an additional interest to this go on account of both men being from the rival camps of the two principals. "Limey" Richards, the husky marine who has appeared here before and shown good form, is working with Jack Cordell and it is said that each camp has made up a jack-pot to be put up on their representative in the preliminary event.

Cordell is working earnestly and with a view to being in the tip-top of condition on Saturday night. He is still the center of attraction at the Orpheum every afternoon and seems to be in more lively mood every day.

Cordell Looks Well.

Jack has taken on a very becoming coat of tan since he has been training and he is as full of ginger and life as a green mule with its first-pack-load. It is a joy to watch him go through his work, there is so much zip to it and he can dispose of all the different sparring partners, who are rash enough to want to work with him, and then call for more.

Dick started in with some harder

work yesterday afternoon. He had been talking things rather easily for a day or two as he is anxious not to go stale, but yesterday he went at it with renewed vigor and gave Miller and Fahy all they could handle out at Fort Shafter.

Fahy will leave for Hilo today so Dick will be one shy in his training force, but he states that Miller can keep him busy and he will work the big fellow overtime today and tomorrow and then slack off again. He will do only a little work on Thursday and on Friday, reduce his training to a short jog on the road.
