SUITS ENDED BY COMPROMISE

Petition Is Granted by Judge Robinson in Afong Action.

Two important suits have been terminated by the successful conclusion of compromise agreements which were officially placed on file yesterday. Judge Robinson granted the petition of the Bishop Trust Company as administrator of the estate of Chun Afong to compromise a suit against F. B. McStocker.

The action was based on the promissory notes for \$2000, bearing the date of December 28, 1898, payable in 1901, 1902, and 1903, the notes all bearing interest at the rate of six per cent.

In the petition for a compromise that was granted yesterday it is stated that in July, 1907, McStocker instituted a suit against the administrator of the estate of Chun Afong on the ground that in September, 1899, Chun Afong was in his debt to the extent of \$32,500, a fee in connection with work incident to the sale of Peepeekeo plantation. The allegation was made that in 1890 Chun Afong left the Territory and that he declined to pay any portion of the claim against him, the principal and interest sued for amounting to \$76,481.52.

In the petition which was filed yesterday it is stated that owing to the death of Chun Afong it would be extremely difficult to make a successful defense to the suit, and that in the event of the defendant's losing the action the balance of the estate would be involved.

An offer was made by McStocker to discontinue his suit if the administrator of the Chun Afong estate would do likewise with the action pending against him and this was agreed to by all the heirs of the Chun Afong estate with the exception of Abraham Afong. The latter was cited to show cause why the petition should not be granted, but he did not appear.

Weekly Weather Bulletin

Honolulu, July 12, 1909.
General Summary.

The mean temperatures were higher than during the preceding week in the Honolulu district of Oahu, the Puna, N. Kona and portions of the Kau and N. Kohala districts of Hawaii, and in the Lihue district of Kauai. In the remaining districts of the section the mean temperatures were lower than last week's. The greatest excess over the previous week's was 1.3 deg., and the deficiency 1.4 deg.

The week was showery, yet, excepting in the windward and Honolulu districts of Oahu, the amounts of rainfall were generally below the average. The following are the amounts, in inches, in the several districts: Hawaii—N. Kohala 0.72 to 1.45, Hamakua 0.14 to 0.87, N. Hilo 2.12 to 2.64, Puna 0.87 to 1.70, Kau 0.00 to 0.67, and the Kona 1.49 to 1.72; Maui—Makawao 2.80 to 3.03, Hana 2.07 to 3.28, Wailuku 0.13 to 0.33, and Lahaina trace; Oahu—Koolauloa, 0.38, Koolau-poko 0.54 to 1.61, Honolulu 0.47, and Ewa 0.02 at the lower levels and 1.91 to 2.25 at the higher; Kauai—Hanalei 1.10, Lihue and Kawaihau 0.31 to 0.48, Koloa 0.45 to 0.85, and Waimea 0.12; and Molokai—Molokai 1.05.

The following are the departures, in inches, from the average of ten or more years: Hawaii—N. Kohala -3.34 to +0.14, Hamakua -0.24 to -0.80, N. Hilo -0.73 to -1.27, S. Hilo -0.47 to +0.17, Puna -0.34, Kau -0.21 to -0.32, and N. Kona -0.11; Maui—Makawao -1.67, and Lahaina -0.18; Oahu—Koolauloa +0.07, Koolau-poko +0.49 to +1.02, Honolulu +0.16, Ewa -0.06, and Wailuku -0.08; and Kauai—Hanalei +0.02, Koloa -0.12, and Waimea 0.00.

The following table shows the weekly averages of temperature and rainfall for the principal islands and for the group:

At the local office of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Honolulu unusually showery, humid, cool weather conditions obtained—showers occurring several times each day and totaling 0.47 inch, 0.16 above the normal for the week, and 0.44 more than during the preceding week. The maximum temperature was 81 deg., minimum 67 deg., and mean 74.1 deg., 3.6 deg. below the weekly normal, and 2.3 deg. lower than last week's. The mean daily relative humidity varied from 64 per cent to 76 per cent, and for the week was 69.1 per cent. Easterly winds prevailed on four dates and northeasterly on the remainder; the average hourly velocity was 11.4. The mean daily barometer ranged from 30.06 to 30.08 inches, and the mean for the week, 30.08, was 0.09 inch above normal.

TESTIFIES IN THE RIOT TRIAL

Fushino Attempts to Show the Gathering Was Very Orderly.

The trial of the ten Japanese charged with rioting at Waipahu was resumed before Judge Robinson yesterday morning. A Fushino, the secretary of the Higher Wage Association and a defendant in the case, having been placed upon the stand as a witness for the defense.

Under the direct examination by Attorney Lightfoot, Fushino declared that he acted as a peacemaker during the progress of the disturbance, and he would not say that there was any general indication of trouble on the part of the Japanese.

He was put through the same form of questioning as have been the other defendants who have been called as witnesses for the defense, but he was far from being at ease when Attorney Kinney for the prosecution took him in hand for cross-examination. His attempt to show that he strained every effort to put an end to the demonstration and prevail upon his fellow countrymen to disperse did not bear up under the rapid-fire questions hurled at him by Kinney, and it was plain enough that there was much hollowness in his version of the gathering at Waipahu.

The testimony and examination of the defendants in the riot trial is taking longer than was first expected, and it is believed that if the trial is concluded next week there will be reason for congratulation. The witnesses for the defense—the defendants—are being examined minutely by Attorney Kinney and the jury is being given a good opportunity to discover how their stories look through a series of questions that bear upon every possible point of the riot at Waipahu on June 10.
