The Honolulu Times will be out today.

The plague prevails to a moderate degree in Tokio, Yokohama and Osaka.

The Japanese Chamber of Commerce delegation is not coming this way. It will sail August 19 for Seattle on the Minnesota.

According to an official of Honolulu plantation, the crop at Aiea will be out of the way about the middle of November. The last grinding in the mill was done the latter part of August last year.

Chief Engineer Kluegel of the Hilo Railroad Company arrived at Hilo yesterday to commence work on the Hakalau extension. Kluegel has with him fifty workmen. B. F. Dillingham stated yesterday that nearly all of the rights of way have been secured and that the way is now open for the commencement of work.

So rapid has been the increase of business of the Hawaiian Electric Company, that the plant is about to be doubled. Alonzo Gartley, manager of the company, stated yesterday that steps will be taken at once to increase the manufacturing capacity of the plant one hundred fold. The 500-volt converter is being taxed almost to its limit and a 500-kilowatt rotary converter will be ordered at once.

DEATH OF ALBERT PRITCHARD.

Albert, son of Joseph Pritchard, manager of the Hamakua Telephone Co., died at Palama Hospital yesterday morning of Bright's disease of the kidneys. The young fellow, who was only fifteen years old, had lived almost all of the time since his mother's death with his grandparents in Canada, his father bringing him to Hawaii on account of his ill-health late last year. Two sisters who had been with him in the East, and who returned at the same time, went with the father to Honokaa and the boy was placed in the hospital for treatment. He showed signs of improvement for a time and endeared himself by his sunny disposition to everyone about the hospital. On Sunday there was a decided change for the worse in his condition and his father was notified. Friends of Mr. Pritchard were assiduous in their attention to the invalid and were with him when he died at 9:30 yesterday morning. He had been unconscious for an hour before passing away. His remains will be sent to Honokaa for interment.
