Mr. Matheson expects there will be at least 250 applicants for certificates between Oahu and Hakalau. He will at once begin work at Oahu, with the aid of an interpreter who came with him, and hopes to finish within ten days.—Hawaii Herald.

INSURANCE REPORT SHOWS PROSPERITY
If increase in the volume of insurance business done in the Territory is to be taken as evidence of increased prosperity and wealth—and it can hardly be disputed that such is the case—then Hawaii can certainly congratulate herself on the showing made in the annual report of the Insurance Commissioner of the Territory for the fiscal year ending April 15, 1909, covering the business of 1908.
In the three principal lines of insurance—fire, marine and life—the total amount written during the year 1908 was \$64,234,835.81, against a total for the preceding year of \$56,833,943.38. This is an advance for 1908 over 1907 of \$7,400,892.43. While a part of the increase may possibly be accounted for by increased activity on the part of insurance agents, it is more probable that most of it may better be accounted for by the increase in the value of Hawaiian property, except in so far, possibly, as the life insurance is concerned.
During 1908 fire insurance to the value of \$28,214,465.13 was written; marine insurance, \$37,590,422.68; life insurance, \$1,429,948. The total premiums paid on all classes of insurance, including accident and health, automobile, burglary, employers' liability, fidelity and surety, and plate glass, amounted to \$719,807.28; renewal premiums on life insurance, \$443,119.63. Losses, claims, etc., paid totaled \$442,056.77.

MANAGER LUCAS IS ILL ON THE COAST
W. T. Lucas, manager of Henry May & Company, is seriously ill of pneumonia in San Francisco. A cablegram to this effect was received Saturday by Dr. Mitchell, his brother-in-law. The crisis may be reached today or tomorrow, at which time Dr. Mitchell expects to receive further news.
Mr. Lucas went to the Coast about six weeks ago and took in the fair at Seattle, going thence to San Francisco, from which city he and Mrs. Lucas were to leave for a vacation in the country.

FATHER CANNOT GIVE HOME TO SON

Because he had no other place to stay, no place to sleep and no place to get anything to eat, except what he could pick up, a little boy named Kanalii Amoka was sent to the Reform school Saturday by Judge Whitney.

The boy has a father, but he doesn't seem to count. He says he is too busy to take care of the child or even to provide a home for him or to feed him. The generous parent was called before the Judge and explained that he works on one of the inter-island steamers and therefore has no time to look after his son. Consequently the child has been in the habit of sleeping out on the grass of parks, in odd corners around the waterfront, in packing cases, wagons, anywhere that he could find to lie down.

He has obtained his meals—or what have had to pass with him for meals—in the same way. Occasionally some waterfront watchman or sailor would divide a lunch with him. But his father is too busy to be bothered with him. So the boy has to go to the Reform school. There seems to be no provision in the Delinquency law by which the father can be starved to death or drawn and quartered or hanged.

GIRL LEAVES HOME FOR SECRET MARRIAGE

Saturday was a lively day for a Japanese father, who went in pursuit of one of his daughters who had left home, with no word of where she was going. It was thought she had run away with a young Japanese. The father had police officers searched everywhere until finally they were rewarded with a sight of the young Japanese man. The irate father was in a mood to do him bodily harm. The officers, however, took charge of the Japanese. The father demanded his daughter, whereupon the young man informed him that he and the girl had been married the night before. The father said the girl was only sixteen but the newly wed hubby said the girl told him she was over eighteen. It is likely that efforts will be made to have the marriage annulled.
