## DRIVING TUNNELS ON LAND OF HAWAII

Hailey (Ida.) Times.—The following letter needs neither explanation nor elucidation:

Kukuihaele, Hawaii,  
June 27, 1909.

Realizing that the period of my silence is approaching a limit, I will pifer a few moments of this company's valuable time and reply to your welcome letter.

I cannot say that reading your weekly edition of The Times is particularly satisfying to me in my present mood, for it tends to bring back those memories of a glorious country, which only result in one more case of aggravated homesickness. However, keep the sheet on the road, for between you and I, it would be missed should a week pass without its arrival. (From so able a critic as myself, this little boost should hurry you to the little brown jug.)

At the present writing I am glad to state that my work is now well in hand, and up to date almost two miles of tunnel is completed, my crews are working on over sixty faces, and by the middle of July all tunnels, seventy-eight in number, will be under way. My men are all Japanese, and, indeed, I must say, so far I have found them poor excuses underground. Physically they are equal to the task; but in a crafty manner which would be a credit to a full-fledged Yankee, they figure every unreasonnable way to dodge contracts and in the end get a "full Nelson" on all the American dollars in sight. I have about reached a decision that no amount of money can pay me to superintend this class of labor, and to that end I am daily planning an early return to Idaho. Just when this will be depends entirely upon the luck I have in financing the Dewey. Suffice to say I will leave no stone unturned to bring about the culmination of a deal.

To say that I have my people well in hand would hardly be a fair statement, for I lack the time to see my parties in person. Should I resign my position on August 1, I will go to Honolulu for several weeks and if good luck is with me, the deal should be

come assured or otherwise in a short time.

Our locality here is most delightful, and I only regret that my work is so ungenial, for by remaining the year out I would be able financially to do much work at the mine independent of outside help.

Be sure and remember me to all of my good Hailey friends and you may say that if I can possibly make it, I will return home before the snow flies. Very sincerely yours,
