set in frock coats and hundreds of Japanese school children. After most of the passengers went ashore the head priest, accompanied by Rev. Mr. Imamura and a delegation of Honolulu Japanese, descended to the wharf where he was greeted by his people. They showed marked respect, and instead of pressing upon him, endeavored to maintain a lane through which he might pass to the carriage waiting for him. The great crowd composed of people of other nationalities, however, pressed upon the line and broke it. Finally, the Patriarch was placed in the carriage with Mr. Imamura seated with him, the carriage being driven through a lane of Japanese. The organizations fell in behind and the march toward the Young Hotel began.

Ran to Keep Up.

The carriage horses started off at a slow trot and soon the organizations had to follow suit and all along the way up King street little perspiring children ran their legs off trying to keep up with the carriage. They finally arrived in front of the Young Hotel, perspiring, but ready for another run, as long as it would be with so high a church dignitary.

After a short rest the Count drove to the Buddhist church on Fort street.

Youthful Patriarch.

Count Soncho Otani is a youthful patriarch. He is about thirty years old, a polished, courtly young man, handsome in a European way, his manners and words betokening the cosmopolitan gentleman. He was extremely affable in his reception of a representative of this paper, who called upon him in the private reception room of the Hongwanji mission. He converses in English and his accent is that of Piccadilly.

Pleased at Welcome.

"We are delighted at the reception given us in Honolulu," he said. "I must confess that I was surprised to find so many of my countrymen and of my church here and the greatness of the welcome rather overpowers me. I regret that I will have no opportunity of seeing more of your country and more of the condition of my people here. Unfortunately I was unable to secure the accommodation I wanted on the Manchuria and that makes it necessary that I continue right on to Japan on the Mongolia."

"I am naturally pleased at the progress my church is making here. Our missionaries have been here a hundred years, I believe?" This last was a question. "I have not heard whether our missionaries are making any converts among the races here other than the Japanese. I do not believe they are. They are not losing many of their members, however."

Here the interview ended and the patriarch took advantage of a few minutes intermission between this and his next reception to light a Turkish cigarette and inhale a few mouthfuls of the scented smoke.

Moving Pictures Taken.

R. K. Bonine, the moving picture man, was on hand to catch some of the unique features of the occasion, running a few hundred feet of film at the mission and later at the schoolhouse.

CARTER MYSTIFIES AND DELIGHTS AUDIENCE

Maskelyne, Cooke, the Davenport Brothers, David Davenant, Hermann and all the rest of the great conjurers and illusionists were imitated to absolute perfection at the Opera House last night when Carter, the Mysterious, held forth.

Honolulu likes to prime itself up and make believe that it is critical. But there was not the least chance in the world to be critical for the show was so good that even Honolulu was carried off its metaphysical feet and wondered aimlessly how all the things were done.

The first part was made up of some clever conjuring. It was very clever conjuring. The cleverest trick was when cards from a pack placed in a goblet in plain view of the audience and on a glass table, rose from the pack at the command of the magician. Then Carter brought on that clever illusion, with a supposedly hypnotized subject rising in the air from a couch with no visible means of support. The magazine writers tell that it is done with a curled steel bar, S shaped at the back. But if anybody can see the bar from the audience they can do better than anybody did last night. The lady hoisted in the air on a chair by means of ropes and then made to disappear at the sound of a pistol shot, is another illusion that has been explained many times. Not a chance to see how Carter does it, though.

Then there are clever spiritualistic stunts in a secret cabinet during which youths who are tempted to go up on the stage from the audience are made the goats. Carter is secretly tied and the doors are closed. Out come his

hands through the windows, bells ring and all kinds of thing happen. When the doors are open, there is the old magician still tied tightly. The latter part of the stunt is sorrowful for the poor youth who is tempted inside the cabinet.

As a conjuring and illusion show, the one that Carter puts on is admirable. Considering that he arrived on the steamer only yesterday morning and yet produced last night a performance that would have done justice to the Egyptian Hall, the original home of mysteries, Carter has done a really wonderful thing.

There will be a performance each night at the Opera House until next Friday. It is more than worth going to see. It is a novelty and as good as one can see anywhere.
