SUNBEAM STAMPS ARE NOW IN CIRCULATION

Already Many of Them Have Been Secured for "Bill Day" Letters—In a Good Cause.

Have you bought your supply of "Sunbeam Stamps" yet? They are on sale, and for an object worthy of what little support is being asked, and a great deal more. The stamps are intended for letters mailed on November 1, although they have no carrying value except to some sick child.

These sunbeams shine in the cloudiest weather, lighting up some place all the time. But, one sunbeam does not make a summer. Remember that when purchasing your supply.

An Explanation.

An "explanation" of the wherefore of the sunbeam stamp is given below by Mrs. Mabel C. Mead, superintendent, and Kate P. Weight, assistant superintendent of the sunbeam class. "The proverbial kindness of Honolulu people is shown by the manner in which they have responded when asked to buy sunbeam stamps, and so help endow a bed in the children's hospital. It seems that every one wants to be kind to helpless children, and that they have learned what one sunbeam class baby told her mother while she was still sobbing, after a much needed spanking, 'My Sunday school teacher says we must be kind.'"

"The sunbeam class babies say so many interesting things: "After a lesson about their souls and bodies, illustrated by a caged bird, a small girl was asked if she could remember any of the story, 'Oh, yes. The lesson was that, God made the bird and Jesus Christ made the cage.' "Another small maiden who has played with Sanford Moses, son of Commander Moses, went home and reported the story of Moses in the bulrushes, but to her mind, it was none other than Sanford Moses who had rested in the tiny basket, and had been so strangely restored to his mother. "A little boy walked to the front of the class one Sunday and announced that he would like a cookie, and another of the smallest babies came bringing her bible, which was no less than someone's small, worn leather account book. "All of the children have been much interested in putting pennies in the small savings bank on the Sunday nearest their birthdays. While the class sings and jingles the money in the bank, their chorus being:

"Jingle, jingle, jingle, jingle,
"Key of love the heart unlocks:
"Jingle, jingle, jingle, jingle,
"Love drops pennies in the birthday box.

"Though it has long been the plan of this class to endow a bed for any needy children it was a surprise to find the hospital near completion and that we had only \$25.11 in the bank.

"On October 10, the mothers interested were asked for suggestions for raising the necessary sum in time for the opening of the hospital.

"Mrs. W. H. Babbitt and Mrs. W. C. Hobby suggested this sunbeam stamp, which we could ask all business houses to use on a given day. "Bids were asked for and the cheapest rate offered for making the die and printing 40,000 stamps was \$50.00, any additional stamps to be at a cheaper rate. This cost, with a little additional printing, will make all expenses about \$55.00.

"Mainly through the efforts of Mrs. Babbitt and Mrs. Hobby we have ob-

tained from sales of stamps \$421.00 and also have in the children's bank at the church about \$12.00 which has been obtained principally from sales of stamps.

"Besides this there are a large number of stamps for sale by interested friends and returns have not yet come in from Chambers Drug Store and Benson, Smith & Co., who have kindly allowed us to put stamps for sale in their stores. "The vital question now is: 'What is to be the price of a perpetual endowment?' different amounts having been suggested. This is to be finally decided at a meeting of the hospital directors next Thursday afternoon. The price for such a bed at the Fabiola Hospital is \$500.

"Some have said Honolulu does not need a children's hospital. They do not know.

"Do you know that in this town there is a little boy, as precious as yours, who has a crooked back and can have no help until the hospital is finished. Then the doctors will have proper appliances and then they hope to straighten that little man's back. What is the price of a few stamps compared with this chance!

"The sunbeam class is to have nothing whatever to say in regard to the children who are to occupy this free bed, that being a matter for the hospital authorities, but it is hoped the children of the class may learn some lessons of kindness and charity through their small connection with the hospital.

"Don't forget Stamp Day the first of November."

CURIOS LETTER ROUTE TO CANADA

One of the most remarkable mail routes in the world is that in which a letter journeys in going from Beebe Plain, Vermont, to Beebe Plain, Quebec, Canada. While the two offices are within 10 feet of each other—are located in the same room, in fact—a letter mailed from one office to the other must make a trip of 294 miles—67 miles in Canada and the remainder in the United States.
