## RELIEVING THE DISTRESSED ONES

Associated Charities' Work for  
Past Two Months—Some  
Impostors Found.

The work of the Associated Charities  
for the past two months is summarized  
by Mrs. A. C. Jordan, the manager, as  
follows:

There have been twenty-nine new ap-  
plications for relief, twenty-two of  
which were in October. Six of these  
were single men—five white men, more  
or less sincere in their requests for  
employment, but apparently more in-  
terested as to meal tickets and cloth-  
ing, and one Hawaiian, who was beg-  
ging on the streets, although able to  
work, and admitting the ability to earn  
\$1.50 a day.

There were fifty-seven recurrent  
cases, the majority of whom are week-  
ly beneficiaries. Twenty families were  
supplied daily with milk. Four persons  
were sent to the hospital on S. F. S.  
beds.

Eleven persons were directed to em-  
ployment, some proving satisfactory to  
their employers, others the reverse, and  
from several no report was received.  
Mr. Isenberg gave employment, on his  
Waialae ranch, to a nineteen-year-old  
Porto Rican boy, who looked rather  
promising. Just one day he trod the  
path of industry, then skipped.

Transportation was secured for three  
persons—to Kauai, to Korea and to the  
Coast.

Expenses were paid for three chil-  
dren at Kawaiahaeo Seminary. A stove  
was procured for one family, and other  
assistance given to keep the blind  
father from begging from house to  
house, as he had been doing for months,  
occasionally going to Kauai to reap  
the harvest there. The public is cau-  
tioned against giving to this man, as  
relief is given from this office.

"Lone Observer" wrote in last Sun-  
day's paper of a Porto Rican family  
in Kakaako, in great straits. The fam-  
ily referred to is Portuguese, and has  
been receiving help for a year and a  
half from the Associated Charities and  
the Portuguese Benevolent Society, as  
well as, more recently, from the Kaka-  
ako Mission. The head of the family,  
who left on the last Alameda, has  
never provided well for his wife and  
children, on account of his drinking  
habits and general shiftlessness. The  
mother, being quite inefficient as far  
as any earning capacity is concerned,  
and having the care of several young  
children, the entire charge of the fam-  
ily will now come upon the community,  
until the man sends for them, as he  
has promised.

In the two months, there have been  
353 calls at the office, and the manager  
has made forty-one visits.

The boys of the West Virginia gave  
the Associated Charities \$100 of the  
proceeds of their minstrel show, which  
will be a great help in the matter of  
relief, as will Mr. Irwin's generous  
donation of \$1000.

The sum of \$693.45 has been expend-  
ed for relief.

## MRS. ATCHERLEY STILL ON DECK

Now we appeal to your honorable  
body, to give us some chance of justice.  
These parties in the attack, are taking  
advantage of our shortcomings in  
financial standing, and I as his wife  
and a helpless mother of five little ones  
is doing the best I can with what little  
knowledge I have of the law to make  
a brave fight, for I know we will gain  
victory in the end. I only fear the  
loss of my husband's life at the cruel  
and murderous Insane Asylum.  
Gentlemen, I have been told by quite  
a few, that it was useless for me to ap-  
peal to you for aid in investigating into  
the cruel attacks against one of Amer-  
ica's own Citizens. I have been told  
that those who had the run of this In-  
sane Law, passed it especially with the  
aid of the Attorney General so there  
would be a chance of locking Dr. At-  
cherley up, because of his interference  
with the former LEPROSY LAW.

### Legislators Not Low.

Gentlemen, I cannot believe that any  
of you are so low as to bear any such  
murderous intent against an innocent  
life, the only man who holds a SYS-

And I humbly beg that upon your in-  
vestigation, if you find that our Com-  
plaint is correct, you will cause him his  
release in some way that you deem fit.

Dr. Atcherley was arrested without a  
cause or any evidence to substantiate  
the Complaint of County Sheriff Jarrett  
or the false testimony of Chester Doyle,  
wherein he stated in Court that Dr. At-  
cherley had threaten to blow the top  
of his head with a short gun. This  
was utterly false. For if Dr. Atcher-  
ley had ever repeated such a thing,  
Chester Doyle as Deputy High Sheriff,  
could have arrested Dr. Atcherley then,
