

- 8-Finals for 100 yards dash.
- 9-Standing broad jump.
- 10-120 yards hurdles, 1st, 2d and 3rd preliminary heats; 1st and 2d in each heat to run in finals.
- 11-Running broad jump.
- 12-440 yards.
- 13-120 yards hurdles finals.
- 14-Hammer throw.
- 15-220 yards hurdles: 1st, 2d and 3rd preliminary heats; 1st, 2d and 3d in each heat to run in finals.
- 16-Shot put.
- 17-220 yards hurdles finals.
- 18-220 yards dash.
- 19-Tug-of-war finals.

All entries to be handed to clerk of course on or before Wednesday, November 24, 1909.
