Jacob Kotinsky has turned in his resignation to the board of agriculture and forestry and it was read and accepted at the board meeting yesterday. No reasons are advanced as leading him to take the action.

The band will play this afternoon until six o'clock at the St. Andrew's fair, there will be no evening concert at Aala Park. Tomorrow, Thanksgiving Day, the band will play at the opening of the children's hospital, off Nuuanu avenue, in the afternoon.

Lloyd Childs has written to Acting-Governor Mott-Smith saying that the Hawaiian exhibit at the Yukon-Alaska Pacific fair is ready packed and will be sent back to Hawaii's shores on the transport Dix, he himself following it later. He reiterates the statements that it has been a vast success.

Acting-Treasurer Hapai has written to the governor's office requesting information regarding which of the surety companies whose bonds are accepted by the federal government are represented in Hawaii. He inclosed a long list of those companies accepted out of which two or three are represented here. Mott-Smith has not yet returned an answer.

The American Medical Association has written to the Governor asking that Hawaii send a delegate to their convention to be held in Chicago, February 28 to March 2, next year. It is probable that this request will be turned over to the Hawaiian Territorial Medical Association and the matter will be left in their hands.

A union Thanksgiving service will be held tomorrow, Thanksgiving Day, at Central Union church at 11 o'clock, all Protestant churches uniting. The sermon will be read by Dr. John T. Jones of the Methodist Episcopal church and Acting-Governor E. A. Mott-Smith will read the President's proclamation. Other parts in the services will be taken by the ministers of the different churches. The Central Union choir has been enlarged for the occasion and will render some special music. The free offering of the day will be donated to the Leahi Home.

The midweek meeting at Central Union this evening will be the annual gathering called the "Home-Church Service." It will be led by the senior deacon of the society, Dr. John M. Whitney. It will be an occasion of reminiscences of past days in the church, and recollections will be given of many who have "gone before." As an active veteran who has truly borne the burden of the hour of the day, Doctor Whitney is especially fitted to direct the service this evening. All members of all families in any way connected with the church are invited to attend. The meeting will begin at half-past seven and continue for an hour.
