

ARMY BILL IS PART OF FLEET BEING TOWED APPROVED BY COMMITTEE

There Is No Pilikia. However, It Being Part of Regular Maneuvers.

Towing four cruisers one division of the Pacific fleet last Sunday was making slow progress toward Honolulu. Four of the big fighters were being brought toward port under the power of the towing cruisers.

But there was no damage. The towing was only a part of the maneuvers. When one division finished the towing maneuver, the towed vessels became the tows and the van quarter fell to the rear and took their turn.

The fleet has been put through its maneuver since leaving Yokohama, and even on the way to the Coast, Admiral Soreau will continue the maneuvering, for it will be his last command.

The fleet is expected here late Monday afternoon, wireless messages having been exchanged between Admiral Soreau and Admiral Rees to that effect. There is a likelihood that wireless messages will be sent to Admiral Soreau today asking him to scan the horizon for the revenue cutter Thetis and ascertain whether she needs any assistance in bringing her prisoners to Honolulu. The Thetis, which travels mainly under sail, may be towed into port, if the fleet runs across her.

FIRE ON BOARD STEAMER MOKOLII

Little Gasoline Craft Saved by the Watchman on the Wharf.

Only by a narrow margin did the gasoline steamer Mokolii, owned by Captain Miller and Eben Low, escape destruction by fire on Friday night, while tied up at her wharf.

The Mokolii has been shifted away from the foot of Fort street to permit the cruiser Denver to be docked. A watchman is kept on board at night and the usual precautions are taken by the owners to prevent the vessel being damaged, slipping her moorings or catching fire.

The damage, while not extensive, will require a little time to repair. Had the flames got a few minutes' start of the watchman's efforts the vessel would probably have been burned. The Mokolii since being taken over by Captain Miller, has been fitted with a powerful gasoline engine and she is a fine little craft.



PARIS TURNS TO RENDER AID

Relief Stations Are Established Throughout the Desolate Capital.

THE SEINE IS NOW RECEDING

Work of Clearing City of Debris Is Now Being Carried on Systematically.

PARIS, January 29.—Sixty relief stations have been established in the city and the work of relieving the sufferings of those who were rendered homeless by the flood is now well under way. Already thousands of persons have applied to the relief stations for aid. Food is being given to the destitute and a supply of clothing is being issued to those who lost all in the disastrous flood.

The waters of the Seine are falling steadily and there is every indication that the danger of greater damage from floods is past. But there is still the danger from crumbling walls and falling buildings to be feared against.

The receding waters have laid bare a scene of utter desolation. Streets once the scene of busy mercantile activity are choked with mud. Houses are in ruins, trees are uprooted and over all there is spread a pall of silence which makes the grewsomeness of the scene more intense. The authorities have started cleaning away the mud and debris, but the people of the city are still too demoralized to render much assistance.
