**LATEST RUSSIANS ARE GOING TO WORK**

All of the Russians who arrived on the Mongolia from the Orient have been booked and assigned to work on various plantations, many leaving on Friday's steamers. The cleanup of this lot of immigrants was pleasing to the labor agents of the planters' association as well as to the immigration board officers.

Yesterday the majority of the Russians arriving on the Tenyo Maru were passed by the immigration authorities and all went bag and baggage to the planters' shed adjoining, where they will be cared for, booked, and sent to sugar plantations where they will be enrolled as laborers.

**GEORGE F. DAVIES IS INTERVIEWED**

New York Sun Gives His Ideas of Sugar Industry in Hawaii.

According to George F. Davies, who has just arrived at the Belmont from Honolulu, says the New York Sun of April 23, a report that recently reached here from Hawaii that the work already done on the Pearl Harbor improvement had been ruined by sand filling in where dredging had been done without foundation.

"I left Honolulu after that statement had been printed in the local papers," said Mr. Davies yesterday, "and I suppose the report that came to New York was taken from them. It was found to be untrue here. I left."

No attempt has been made to clean out the entire bottom of the harbor, but they have dredged channels. A ship was being towed in through one of these channels and they got her over too far to one side of the course and she went aground. Some little sand may have been washed into the channel, but not enough to make a perceptible difference in the depth of the water.

Mr. Davies is an Englishman, although he was born in Hawaii, his father having gone out there during the days of King Kalakaua. He is a sugar planter.

"Fully 90 per cent. of the exports of Hawaii consists of sugar," said Mr. Davies yesterday, "and as the price of raw sugar is high, Hawaii is prosperous, and the outlook is good. There has been a boom of late in Hawaii pineapples, which seem to be driving the Singapore article out of the market. Pineapple growing does not require the enormous acreage that sugar cane does. The limit of cane cultivation seems to be very nearly reached in the Hawaiian Islands, for the reason that as all the islands are volcanic, sloping up to mountains in the center, the area in which cane can be grown is restricted by nature."

"There seems to be one disadvantage in Hawaii being a Territory instead of a colony and that is while we have a protected market we have labor that is protected, while in most countries which produce tropical fruits there is cheap labor. We have Japanese and Chinese labor it is true, but that is no longer cheap."

Officers of the Portuguese cruiser San Gabriel paid an informal visit to Fort Shafter shortly after the noon hour on Friday. The party of distinguished guests, in four automobiles, reported directly to headquarters, the Administrative building, where they were received and graciously shown around by the commanding officer of the "moody post."
