

## ATCHERLEY KEEPS BOARD OF HEALTH ON JUMP

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Dr. John Atcherley and the lepers occupied the attention of the board of health yesterday for three hours and at the end of the discussion the members adjourned without deciding what they were going to do.

President Eaton, who declared he was on the fence on the question of permitting or preventing treatment by Doctor Atcherley of patients at the isolation hospital, conducted a rapid fire investigation of Doctor Atcherley, asking him many questions, but seldom pausing for reply.

Hebra Oliver McNatt declared that the petition unanimously signed by the lepers that Doctor Atcherley be restored to them was really the work of one or two, the rest being ejected into a gutter.

William Flagnor, interceding for seventeen-year-old William Meyers, confined as a leper, said he had visited the hospital and all the inmates agreed in the wish to have Doctor Atcherley back.

Former Health Officer Herbert Gunn counseled the board that it would be against medical procedure to allow Atcherley to treat the lepers by medicines and formulas unknown to the profession.

Eaton said it was not a question of professional ethics, but of the board's responsibility for the lives and health of the lepers under its charge.

Miss Frey, who for the last twelve years has visited and cared for the colony, asked Doctor Eaton why the lepers should not be permitted to have the opinion of Doctor Atcherley's treatment when they wish it, and "when you admit you are helpless to aid them and they are helpless of leading."

Dr. Frank Tillman said he "saw no reason why Doctor Atcherley should not be permitted to try the experiment of giving the lepers his treatment. Nothing has been done for these unfortunate in the twelve years past, and surely if they die under the treatment they will be none the worse off."

The raising of the submerged submarine Phloxine at Calais, France, showed a great hole in the hull caused by a collision with a channel steamer. Twenty-seven lives were lost in the accident.
