ARLINGTON BLOCK BEING RAZED
 Section Ripped Out to Provide Lane From Street to Street.
 The Waikiki section of the old Arlington Hotel is being demolished and the stores beneath are being evacuated by firms now occupying them. The section is being cut off to provide space for the lane which will run from Hotel to King street, providing a continuous rear passageway for all the business blocks fronting on Fort street on the Waikiki side. Should the Bishop Estate ever build on the Alexander Young Hotel park, the alleyway will also provide an areaway for all the stores fronting on Bishop street.

The work of demolishing the Arlington Hotel was started on Thursday and much of the brickwork has disappeared.

The Brewer Estate which owns or controls most of the property fronting on Hotel, Fort and King streets, has plans to extend some of the buildings in the rear sections, to provide warehouses and otherwise provide greater storage space for the firms.

The Brewer Estate stands ready to erect a modern office building on the site of the present Bulletin office, if tenants offer to take leases on the same.

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
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
