CHRISTMAS FESTIVITIES FOR MANY CHILDREN

Trees, Gifts and Plays Help to Instill Lesson of the Day Celebrated.

St. Andrew's Sunday school held its Christmas festival on Thursday evening, in the Memorial Hall. Canon Ault conducted a brief service, after which carols were sung. The Bishop spoke of the danger in Christmas festivals dwelling on Santa Claus and forgetting the great message of the day.

A very interesting feature of the evening was a Japanese play showing how a little child led her grandparents to forgive the disobedience of their daughter. The Bishop explained that the play told a beautiful story illustrating the words "A little child shall lead them." At the close gifts were distributed to the children.

Yesterday afternoon at three o'clock was held the Christmas festival for the children of St. Mary's Mission, Moiliili. There is no room at St. Mary's large enough to hold the 180 children connected with the work, so seats were arranged in the open facing a shed in which was a Christmas tree and a manger. The children sang carols about Christmas and while these were sung, boys dressed as shepherds were seated on the ground while a number of girls of various races dressed to represent angels sang the angel's song.

Then came a carol about the three wise men, and three boys, as the wise men, sang the solo parts very well and went to the manger with their gifts.

At the close of the services Miss Van Deerlin and Miss Chung distributed gifts and packages of candy to the children. Many visitors and parents of children were present.

Last evening in the Davies Memorial Hall the Cathedral Hawaiian Congregation Sunday school held their Christmas festival. In many respects it resembled that held the night before. All the children were made happy with gifts.

Last evening St. Mary's also had a festival for the older scholars of the mission.

Tonight St. Peter's Chinese Sunday school will hold their Christmas tree and festivities in the Memorial Hall of the cathedral. At St. Elizabeth's, in Palama, a Christmas program has been prepared for this evening for those under the care of the mission. The Christmas tree for Holy Trinity, Japanese, will take place on Monday evening.

The Kapahulu mission will hold its Christmas tree festival on Wednesday next.
