


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ARMY AND NAVY NEWS

ADJUTANT-GENERAL FOR DISTRICT OF HAWAII

Major Archibald Campbell, Coast Artillery Corps, has been detailed, by direction of the President, for service in the adjutant-general's department to take effect April 13, vice Major Sidney Jordan, adjutant-general's department, relieved, and will proceed to San Francisco and report to the commanding general of the department of California for duty. Major Campbell will stand relieved from duty at headquarters, department of California, at such time as will enable him to leave San Francisco for Honolulu about May 5. On arrival here he will report to the commanding general of the district of Hawaii for duty as adjutant-general.

New Marine Officer.

Second Lieut. G. A. Johnson has been detached from the Marine Officers School, and ordered to duty at the Marine Barracks, Honolulu. He will arrive here early in January.

Officer Not Worried.

SAN FRANCISCO, December 22.—Major W. W. Forsyth of the Sixth Cavalry, who has charge of the Yosemite National Park, yesterday said that the charges which are reported to have been made against him by Thomas H. Carter, a contractor, are ridiculous and absurd. Major Forsyth is at the Presidio, where he has come to spend his two months' leave.

Carter, who is a member of the firm of Carter & McAnaney, has charged Major Forsyth and Supervisor Gabriel Sovulewski with having shown unjust discrimination against his firm in the awarding of contracts for road work.

Other serious charges were made by the contractor, and as a result Special Agent Dixon was detailed by the secretary of the interior to make an investigation. This was recently concluded and the report will be sent to Washington for Ballinger's action.

To Fix Blame.

TACOMA, December 23.—The navy department has ordered a general court martial at Puget Sound navy yard for the trial of Passed Assistant Paymaster E. R. Wilson, Paymaster's Clerk Garity and Yeoman Jaques, in connection with the theft of \$2200 from the paymaster's safe of the cruiser Philadelphia last July. The court will convene on January 9th with Captain Gill, commanding officer of the Colorado, as president.

The Second's Orders.

NEWPORT, Kentucky, November 29.—The official orders from the war department ordering the Second Infantry to leave for the Hawaiian Islands have been received at Fort Thomas. The order does not fix the date upon which the departure will be made. Gen. John Hodges, commander of the department of the Lakes, will come to Fort Thomas early next month. This is taken to be the first move by the department to abandon the Fort Thomas post altogether. The business men of Covington, Newport and the Highlands have named a special committee to go to Washington to urge the department to retain the regiments at this fort.

A Local Order.

The following designations of officers to conduct the professional examinations of captains and first and second lieutenants for detail in the department are announced: Department of California, Benicia, California—The commanding officer of the Arsenal, California. For the district of Hawaii—Such officer as the commanding general of the Department of California may designate.

Another Gun Explodes.

WASHINGTON, December 15.—One of the six-inch guns of the armored cruiser Pennsylvania burst at the muzzle yesterday while the ship was at target practice off the Pacific Coast. There were no casualties.

Rear Admiral Barry, commanding the Pacific fleet, reported the accident to the navy department from Mare Island today. He said that he would investigate the cause of the explosion as soon as possible.

The gun was a old one, unhooped at the muzzle. There are 132 of these guns, and Rear Admiral Mason, chief of ordnance, has already requested an appropriation to defray the cost of hooping the gun to the muzzle.

Marines at Pearl Harbor?

About twenty-five enlisted men of the Marine Corps will be sent to the naval station Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and the ship number to Guam as soon as transportation can be arranged for them and early in the coming year as possible says the Army and Navy Register. About six of the second lieutenants are to graduate from the marine school of application at Fort Royal will be sent to the Philippines for duty.

Troops for Hawaii.

Brigadier General Aleshire, quartermaster-general of the army, who was before the house committee on military affairs about December 11, discussing the affairs of his department, said of Hawaii:

The quartermaster-general explained the purpose of an increased appropriation for construction at Honolulu. It is desired to construct temporary quarters for an additional squadron of cavalry, a battalion of field artillery, with a regimental headquarters, and a regiment of infantry. It is believed that the war department intends to garrison Honolulu with a considerable force, which will eventually consist of one regiment of cavalry, two regiments of infantry, one battalion and regimental

headquarters of field artillery, one company each of signal and engineer corps and the necessary sanitary corps. These would be in addition to the coast artillery corps now located in the Hawaiian Islands.

Japan Reorganizes Navy.

VICTORIA, British Columbia, December 22.—The Japanese navy is being reorganized and a number of vessels stricken off the effective list, among them the battleship Chinyen, captured from China, and the Iki, captured from Russia, according to advices brought by the Kamakura Maru. The Iki place is taken by the Fuji, one of two battleships for which the diet refused to grant money, with the result that the emperor decreed that ten per cent of all official salaries should be signed for ten years to build two vessels.

Of Local Interest.

Maj. G. C. Long, formerly commandant of the marine barracks, Honolulu, has been ordered to command the marine barracks, navy yard, New York.

The Bids.

WASHINGTON, December 22.—Bids for the construction of the caissons for drydocks now in process of building at the Pearl Harbor (Hawaii) naval station, the New York navy yard and the navy department were opened today.

The labor law, involving application of the eight-hour law to the construction of the caissons, was not decided by the attorney-general, who said the case was beyond his jurisdiction. The navy department informed that the point would not be taken up by the government.

In the event the unions raised the question, it was said. The lowest bidder for the New York caisson was the Squire & Trieste Company, New York, whose price was \$120,000. The lowest bidder for the two caissons, its proposal for the Harbor caissons being \$110,000 for the Puget Sound structure \$900.

The Union Iron Works, San Francisco, offered to build both the Pearl Harbor and Puget Sound caissons for \$70,000; the Pearl Harbor alone for \$44,675, or the Puget Sound alone for \$41,695.


