let him know later. I told I would on no account so agree without an opportunity to consult my mother about it, and so the conference ended. The next day, in obedience to orders, I was standing in the hall of the jail when J. F. Bowler, an American citizen who had been convicted of misprision of treason by the Military Commission, and was then in convict's garb, passed me. Jailor Low came to where I was standing with others, pointed at Bowler, and said, in the hearing of myself and others: "That's the way with the fools. They get the chance to leave and they don't take it. It appears that one man is enough to convict before the court martial." I replied to him that if a man had no guilt on his conscience he might rest easy. Jailor Low responded: I wouldn't advise a man, particularly if he has an enemy connected with the court martial, to take the risk."

Later, when the subject of going was again being discussed between Mr. Low and me he informed me he thought there was no prospect of my obtaining an early trial, and he would advise all with whom he was friendly to accept the offer of release, and repeated that I would be wise to take no risks, as one witness was enough to convict before the court-martial. I was aware that the court-martial had convicted upon the slightest evidence, and some upon no evidence of the charge laid against them and that it was the practice of the Government to use inquisition tactics to obtain evidence where none existed. I have read the statements of Messrs Henry A. Juen and Nicholas Peterson, submitted in support of their claims for imprisonment under conditions similar to those above described, and I can substantiate their statements as to the methods used by the Hawaiian Government to obtain evidence and confessions of the guilt of the political prisoners. Fully believing that the military court was illegal; that it had no jurisdiction to try and sentence for offenses charged to have been committed when no war existed; that its sessions in a time of peace, and when the civil courts were regularly running was a usurpation, and fully believing that all persons who should be arraigned before that tribunal, upon whatever charge, would be convicted; and that innocence would be no defense before it, I concluded, upon the advice of my mother, to sign the agreement to leave the country, merely as a means of escaping from conditions which I believed to be illegal, despotic and a gross violation of my rights under treaties with the United States, and under the Constitution of Hawaii. I declare that I signed no admission or confession of guilt or complicity in the revolt, and that I signed my consent to leave Hawaii under duress, my will in the matter being coerced by the threat of indefinite imprisonment, to be followed by a trial before the illegal military court, with its accompanying prospect of further outrage. I repeatedly told the Marshal, when the pay which I signed (no copy being allowed to me), was presented for my signature, that I was not guilty of any offense, but that I was not guilty of any offense, but that I was signing so as to terminate an illegal and unjust imprisonment.

All opportunity of obtaining redress, either from the Government or from individuals of Hawaii, has been swept away by recent legislation of that Government. I was never furnished with any charges of illegal conduct—none such were made against me, to the best of my knowledge—and to this day I am ignorant of the cause of my arrest and detention. I feel that I should be liberally compensated for the suffering inflicted upon me in the premises, and claim the sum of \$25,000 in this behalf.

MILITARY M.

General McLean Issues Orders. In promoting the military force in which Mr. Dole's government indulges, two "orders" have been issued by Colonel McLean, U. S. N. The review which this great military genius desires to hold of his "army" will take place on the 4th of July at 8:30 a. m. It is probably well that an hour previous to the horse-races has been selected. The following are the "orders" published in the official organ:

No. 33 calls for the annual inspection and muster of all troops of the National Guard on or before June 30th. Major George F. McLeod will act as inspecting officer.

No. 7 orders Companies A, B, C, D, E and F, First Regiment, N. G. H., to assemble at the Armory at 8:30 a. m., Thursday July 4th, for review by the Commander-in-Chief. Uniform, dress, white trousers, leggings and gloves.
