THE LEGISLATURE.
 SENATE.
 Our reporter was not present yesterday, owing to financial obligations, but the following is collected from the other papers, to whom our thanks are due: The Honolulu Library and Reading Room Association petitioned for exemption from \$12,000 assessed taxes for 1894. Referred to Finance Committee. Committee on Commerce reported favorably on the low-grade Kerosene Withdrawal Act and on the Currency Act. The latter was made to have gold and silver deposits against notes inconvertible. The cable enabling Act passed third reading. Senator McCandless asked of the Minister of Foreign Affairs if any demand had been made on the Government arising out of arrests made during the January uprising. Senator Brown thought information of that nature ought to be kept secret. It was impolitic to make it public. The Minister did not reply. Several bills were reported as having been handed to the President for signature. The Senate then adjourned.
