**THE LEGISLATURE.**

**SENATE.**

The Senate met as usual this  
 morning. A communication from  
 the House notified that the Low  
 Grade Kerosene withdrawal bill  
 had been indefinitely postponed.  
 Also that on the bill conceding  
 rights of way over the land of others  
 that the joint conference com-  
 mittees report had been adopted.  
 Minister W. O. Smith rose to state  
 that at last a definite proposition as  
 to laying a cable between the United  
 States and here and also between  
 the Islands had been received. The  
 matter was now ready and would be  
 laid before the Senate at latest by  
 to-morrow morning if possible.  
 The executive were carefully con-  
 sidering it. He had suggested tak-  
 ing a recess for two weeks, and  
 then having the Houses meet again,  
 but on investigation he had found  
 that a great many members objected  
 especially those in the lower House.  
 However he would say that the to  
 be unfolded proposition came be-  
 fore the executive in a more busi-  
 ness-like and tangible shape than  
 ever anything of the kind had been  
 placed before. It was rather short  
 notice, but the first really definite  
 proposition had not been made to  
 the Executive till after the arrival  
 of Col. Z. S. Spalding last Friday.  
 Senator Baldwin said he had talked  
 with members of both House and  
 Senate and the Hawaii members  
 as well as those from Hana, Maui,  
 do not want to take a recess as it is  
 too expensive a trip. He would say  
 for his own part if the terms at  
 present asked for are adhered to it  
 will certainly require a recess to pass  
 the bill, but if they were modified  
 the bill could be passed this week.  
 Senator Brown said his opinion was  
 that this cable question was so vital  
 to the best interests of the country,  
 both political and commercial, that  
 the Legislature should not adjourn  
 before passing or rejecting it. It  
 was solely within the province of  
 the Legislature to grant any subsidy  
 or approve of one being granted to  
 the enterprise. He favored sitting  
 until the bill was through with.  
 After desultory remarks the Senate  
 adjourned till to-morrow.
