Commercial Notes.

(From a Private Correspondence.)

There will be a rise in raw sugar before six months, as there is a considerable shortage in Cuba, and there is about fifteen per cent less sowing of beet than last year.

The sentiment among business men in this city (New York) and of many men met in travelling is opposed to annexation of the Hawaiian Islands, but in favor of a protectorate and closer trade relations as soon as they have a popular government in Hawaii, and not one maintained by force.

The rice market in San Francisco is demoralised. Importers of island are asking 4 1/2 cents net but prices will go lower as jobbers refuse to meet this figure. Good Carolina is offered at 4 1/2 cents laid down. The domestic crops of rice will be a very large one this year.
