W. N. Armstrong Explains

The following letter to the Star does not seem to us to fit with Mr. Armstrong's first letter to the Advertiser. The public can now judge from his own words who is to blame for our epidemic.

"Editor Star:—

The statement made in your issue of Saturday that Miss Wyrick, a passenger on the Belgic had remarked while visiting here, that it was known to the passengers, that three Chinese in the steerage had died of cholera, on the voyage from Yokohama, is not, I believe, correct.

I was seated in the dining room during the voyage, next to this lady, and the question of quarantine in this port was discussed several times, and on every occasion, it turned only upon the points of the extent of cholera in Japan, and no allusion was ever made to any sickness on board.

Mr. Vivanti, the head of one of the largest of the milk houses in Yokohama, with his wife, sat opposite, at the same table, and discussed the matter. I am sure that Mr. Vivanti would have mentioned to me the matter of cholera on board the vessel if he had heard of it. If there was a rumor of cholera on board, Miss Wyrick and the other ladies were the most extraordinarily self possessed women I ever met.

I do not for a moment undertake to defend Dr. B. wis of the Belgic. But I don't think it fair to hang him first and try him afterwards.

BY AUTHORITY.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

1. From and after this date all persons are forbidden to use any water from the Nuuanu stream, or Honolulu harbor, or from bathing in said stream or harbor, from throwing anything, liquid or solid, into said stream or harbor, or permitting any liquid or drainage flowing into said stream or harbor.
 2. The sale, in the District of Honolulu, of fish, shell-fish or any product of the sea is prohibited.
 3. Until further orders no passengers or freight will be allowed to be conveyed from the Island of Oahu to any other island of the group.
 4. No letters or mail matter shall be taken from the Island of Oahu to any other island of the group, excepting from the General Post Office in mail bags; no mail matter shall be allowed to leave the Post Office until thoroughly fumigated.
 5. The manufacture of poi is prohibited in that portion of Honolulu bounded by Nuuanu street on the East, Judd street on the North, and on the West by a line drawn from the corner of Judd and Liliha streets, down Liliha street to the sea.
