**Honolulu High School.**

Punctually at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the dedicatory exercises began. The building on Emma street, heretofore known as Princess Ruth's residence, will now be known both officially and privately, as the High School. The building was crowded. Every available space in the corridors, on the stairways, and on the piazzas, being occupied by the interested friends of education, who came to see, and to be seen, to listen, and who tried to hear the interesting programme provided. On the lawn outside the government band played pleasing selections before and after the exercises inside. Proceedings were opened by Principal M. M. Scott in a short speech, in which he welcomed the auditors and praised the Board of Education for their liberality in providing the building, and the trustees of the Bishop estate for their generosity in allowing it to be sold for so low a figure. The school choir then sang, tremulously but nicely, "Firmly We Stand." Lieutenant G. W. R. King's daughter then recited "The Chambered Nautilus" in clear tones most gracefully. Miss Girvin next read an address of thanks to the President and members of the Board of Education. In this she said: "Every precaution will be taken to preserve the building and grounds in the condition in which they were found." Professor Alexander, President of the Board of Education, read a speech, and was followed by President Dole in oral remarks on his school days and his boyish experience with top boots. Mrs. Dillingham did not read a poem, by herself or anyone else, but instead read an allegory. A. T. Atkinson, the Inspector-General of schools, made a few brief remarks in denunciation of his native land, and the exercises were closed by the singing by the pupils of Prof. Dodge's anthem to Mrs. Tucker's music. The visitors then proceeded to inspect the building and grounds and the function was over. Honolulu has now a beautiful building, perhaps the most beautiful in its midst as its new High School. May teachers and pupils be worthy of it and its historic associations.

The directors of the Kalakaua Monument Association held a meeting yesterday afternoon. The magnificent bust of the late King by Allen Hutchinson was accepted and will be permanently placed in the Palace. It is possible that the bust will be exhibited in the Kiloana Art League for a short while. The subscriptions to the fund amount to \$2,000.
