Her education and culture are European, her manner benign and dignified, and her self-possession remarkable. * * *

Though she said that she was not advised about the situation, it is certain that her ignorance is not likely to be permanent. Since her arrival in San Francisco she has been in consultation with Charles R. Bishop the famous Hawaiian banker, who married an Hawaiian chiefess second only in rank to the direct descendants of Kamehameha. Bishop has never been quite in touch with the Dole Government and resides in San Francisco as much for that reason as because of his interests in the California Bank here. His wife was from childhood the intimate friend and companion of ex-Queen Liliuokalani, who for many years resided in Mrs. Bishop's house before she was called to the throne. (In fact she was brought up in the home of Mrs. Bishop's parents, and according to Hawaiian custom regarded as a foster sister. ED. INDEPENDENT.) Mr. Bishop understands the situation and whatever may be best for the interests of Liliuokalani and her people he is in a position to advise her. * * * She is a woman of charity large and broad humanity.—S. F. Examiner.
