**In the District Court.**

Two "okolehao" distilling cases were heard in the District Court this morning. One was against a Chinaman, who said that he bought the okolehao from a Portuguese in Kalih valley. He knew the man's name but did not know where his residence is. Judge Wilcox reserved decision to Friday to give the police a chance to assist the defendant in finding "Frank." In the second case the defendant was a Portuguese who admitted having some okolehao in his house which his wife had bought from an unknown kanaka, who apparently peddles the contraband stuff. The defendant only uses the liquor to blend his home-made grape wine, and also mixed with certain herbs and spices for medicinal purposes. The Magistrate in this case also reserved decision until Friday morning.

**St. Andrew's Day.**

Services were held in St. Andrew's Cathedral to-day, it being St. Andrew's day. It is also the anniversary of the death of Libolibo the II. (or King Kamehameha IV), husband of Queen Emma, who died in 1863 and it was in commemoration of his death on St. Andrew's day that the Cathedral was so named the property having been given by him.
