FASTER DAY SERMON.

The Last Preached by the Bishop
of Honolulu Under Anglican
Jurisdiction.

And the third day he shall rise
again.—S. Mark x:34.

The fulfillment of this prediction,
which at the time it was given, in-
spired no hope in the hearts of those
who heard it, is the source of our
Easter rejoicings in which all Christ-
endom today unites. And these re-
joicings on earth are but the faint
echo of the jubilant praises of the
Angelic hosts, ever offered before the
throne of God by ten thousand times
ten thousand voices: Worthy is the
Lamb that was slain to receive power
and riches and wisdom, and strength,
and honor, and glory and blessing.
The redemption of mankind by the
Death and Resurrection of Jesus
Christ calling forth the never ceasing
praise and adoration of all the com-
pany of heaven.

To enter at all into the meaning
of so ir retrievable a loss. He had been
condemned to death by the chief
priests and rulers of the Church. It
was this that caused His scattered
disciples to lament, and to feel that
their trust that He should have re-
deemed Israel had been a vain trust,
while all around the world, and the
Church that was imbued with the
spirit of the world, rejoiced to be rid
of the One who had been its uncom-
promising enemy.

Such we may be sure was the pub-
lic sentiment in Jerusalem on the Sab-
bath day that followed the day of the
Crucifixion. From the world's point
of view the cause of Christ was
crushed utterly. But the world's view
is superficial. How came it that in
that hour or two of the Sanhedrim
had the courage to attend to the burial
of the Crucified. Faithful women too
had stood beside the cross, and watch-
ed the entombment until the stone
was rolled up against the door of the
sepulcher and then went home to pre-
pare spices and ointments for the em-
balming of the Body. But faithful
though they were to His memory they
were unable to realize that He had
foretold all that had happened, and
so to feel and know that as surely as
He had been slain so surely would
He rise on the third day. Of this in
that hour of bitter grief not one
seems to have had any anticipation.
The only person, who seems to have
thought it possible was Pilate. At
least there seems an irony in his
words to the priests and the Phari-
sees: "Ye have a watch, go your way,
make it as sure as you can." As if he
had some strange foreboding that the
watch and the seal would be in vain.

But hopeless as it seemed to the
scattered disciples that He should rise
again His word could not fail. The
morning of the third day has come.
Rumors were current that the cruci-
fied Lord had been seen. But those
who heard them dismissed them as
idle tales. The first to believe in the
Resurrection was S. John, who from
contemplation of the grave clothes
left in order in the tomb went home
believing that the Lord was risen.
In the evening when the eleven met
in the upper room, in fear and trem-
bling for what might happen, the two
who had been to Emmaus were greet-
ed on arriving with the announce-
ment that He had appeared to S.
Peter.

But in spite of this His appearing
amongst them filled them at first with
terror, such is the natural dread that
men have of apparitions from another
world. But when they had recovered
from the first impulse of fear, who
can tell the joyful amazement of that
moment, when they realized His pres-
ence, that it was their very Lord
standing before them in that very
Body which had been born of Mary.
