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

STUBBS TALKS OF HIS TRIP.

HE IS NOW EN ROUTE TO THIS TERRITORY.

To Make Interesting and Important Inquiries for Agricultural Department.

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 14.—Professor William C. Stubbs of the experiment station has received his commission and instructions from the Secretary of Agriculture relative to his Hawaiian trip, and will start this evening for San Francisco to embark on the Australia for Honolulu. His wife will accompany him. A reporter called on the professor at his home last night, and found him deep in the details requiring his attention incident upon his departure and absence from the station.

Mrs. Stubbs was sitting with him, deeply interested in the study of some books which had just come from the press. She is an authoress and student of literature, particularly of a genealogical and biographical nature, and in addition is the companion of her husband in his daily excursions into the realms of scientific research so dear to his heart.

"You see where I am," said Professor Stubbs, as the reporter was about to begin asking questions. "I am almost in the condition that the trunk seat of my name into when he put it on this new traveling case upside down. I have a pile of letters to answer, and a bundle of instructions to study, and the details of the station to look after, so you see I cannot talk," and he forthwith began to talk in his own inimitable manner about the California trip, his new experiments in tea culture, his article on orange culture in preparation for a great encyclopedia, the consideration and kindness of Secretary Wilson, and other interesting topics, but not a word about his mission to the islands. The reporter saw the ruse, for he was beginning to learn the professor's modest nature, and to realize that it is almost impossible to get him to talk when his talk is apt to disclose the great importance of any mission with which he may be investigated.

"Well, you know," said the professor in answer to queries, "it would not be right for me to tell everything I know about the department business. I am only sent out to look at things and tell what I see, and certain lines have been indicated upon which to report. I shall make a preliminary report about September 1, and my full report will be made after my return. The instructions of the department have been very full and explicit, and cover every branch of my inquiries.

"I can say, however, that the general scope of my investigations will embrace the agricultural conditions in the islands, the needs of the people, and the most feasible lines upon which the Government may establish an agricultural experiment station or stations. I may also add that these questions will have to be investigated in the condition I studied and reports made with great attention to detail, and to making suggestions which may be made susceptible of practical execution. I can also tell you that my work will occupy at least thirty days in the islands exclusive of time spent in travel and in the preparation of reports."

Professor Stubbs explained in more detail some of the matters that would be subjects of his study. The immense field that he is expected to cover would cause any man less perfectly equipped for his work to give up the attempt.

"How do you expect to do it all?" asked the reporter.

"Oh, I shall find the islands full of assistants. Dr. Maxwell, the director of the sugar planters' experiment station there, went out upon my recommendation. He was associated with me for years, and they will all help me greatly. One curious thing. Among my papers are several letters of introduction to people prominent in the islands, Governor Dole and others, and among them is a letter to Mr. Storey, who is an old pupil of mine, and whom I sent out there some years ago. He is one of their most prominent scientific agriculturists."

The question of irrigation alone presents in the islands stupendous problems, upon a practical solution of which immense interests depend. The financial phase of the work and the policy to be pursued by the Government with reference to the work already being done there by private and public enterprise, the acquisition of lands and the necessities of the work in the way of station and plant are all immense subjects, which will necessarily occupy the professor's attention, but upon these and other details he refused to be interviewed.

He expects to return about the last of September, and will make his report to the Secretary at Washington in person.

CAPTAIN COOK'S COMING TO THESE ISLANDS

Recalled by Kapiolani Estate in Amended Petition in Ejectment Suit.

The Kapiolani Estate, Limited, vs. Mary H. Atcherly, Alice K. Spencer, Rebecca Kinimaka and M. Percival Kinimaka, has filed an amended petition in its ejectment suit. The petition is longer than a Fourth of July oration or the coming of rapid transit. It goes back to the arrival of Captain Cook in these islands, and a royal patent issued by Kamehameha III on August 30, 1853, when Honolulu was the rendezvous for whalers and clothing was little known and little worn.

The estate claims that it received its title from Kalakaua long before he became king, wore the crown and wielded the scepter of power.

The plaintiff wants defendants removed from 2.22 acres on Punchbowl and from deer and wild turkey preserves on Molokai.

The case has been in the courts and recorded has been destroyed by cockroaches and flying ants. But the law still hangs on, while the earth revolves around the sun, babes are born, grow old, die and pass into the realms of space.
