## The Effect of Lord Roberts' Proclamation.

General Belief That the War is Rapidly Nearing a Close—Buller Crowding Both.

London, Sept. 5.—Lord Roberts' annexation of the Transvaal is generally regarded as proof that in the opinion of the military authorities both at home and in South Africa the war is practically over. The Stock Exchange takes this view and most Kaffir shares show a slight rise on the prospect of mining operations. Nevertheless there has been a good deal of miscellaneous fighting in various parts of the annexed republics.

The War Office received a dispatch from Lord Roberts giving an account of a slight engagement north of Pretoria, in which the Boers were driven off, losing a hundred rifles and a large supply of ammunition and a few prisoners. About the same time a party of Boers made an unsuccessful attack on the Johannesburg water works. More serious fighting took place on Monday in the mountain passes near Lydenberg, where General Buller was fighting Botha all day. The burghers were about 2,000 strong, with several guns, and they seem to have held the British in check, since the position was not carried by nightfall and a column was sent by General Roberts to assist Buller. It is thought, however, that Botha is merely fighting to cover the removal of his transport and supplies from Lydenberg and that he will retire to the mountains farther north, where the next stand will be made.

The effect of the proclamation will cause Transvaal burghers now in arms to be treated as rebels and forfeit belligerent rights. It is hoped by this means the hopelessness of further resistance will be speedily brought home to the Boers. But the experience of the Orange River colony is not altogether encouraging. After six months' annexation the burghers are still in arms in the Eastern Free State and in sufficient force to put a British garrison in danger of surrendering. Telegrams from the Basutoland frontier show that the Boer commandos have surrounded Ladybrand and reduced the defenders to such straits that they have burned all their stores in the market place to prevent their falling into the enemy's hands. General Hunter is hastening to the relief of the garrison and it is hoped that he may be in time to save it.

De Wet is said to be north of Middleburg, watching for an opportunity to intercept British communications. Mr. Chamberlain, who has been at his country house near Birmingham for the last few weeks, came to London yesterday and was busily engaged with officials of the Colonial Office. His visit is understood to be in connection with the South African situation and the approaching conclusion of the war.

Much activity is also exhibited at the headquarters of the party organization, where it is confidently expected that a general election will begin about six weeks from the present time.

Krueger and Steyn Fleeing.  
Pretoria, Sept. 2.—Mr. Krueger and Mr. Steyn have gone to Barberton. It is believed they are preparing for flight. The general opinion is that the war is now very near the end; but should the Boers construct strongholds in the bush and begin a system of raids, the British would require further large supplies of horses.

Seige of Ladybrand Raised.  
Cape Town, Sept. 5.—The seige of Ladybrand has been raised after several desperate attempts to capture the town and its little garrison of 150 British troops. The Boers who attacked Ladybrand are estimated to have numbered over 2000 men.

The British were summoned to surrender September 2 (Sunday), but refused, and from that time on were subjected to continual cannon and rifle fire. The burghers twice tried to rush the British position. Probably the approach of a relief force saved the little garrison.

Watching for Scale Pests.  
Washington, Sept. 1.—The Postoffice Department will issue, probably early next week, instructions to postmasters at all ports of entry on the Pacific Coast to submit all packages of plants and fruits from the Hawaiian and Philippine Islands to the Boards of Horticulture of their respective states for examination as to whether they contain insects known to prevail in those islands. The California Horticulture Board recently requested that this action be taken to save the Pacific Coast from the pests, which, it claims, would do great damage.

Roosevelt's Western Tour.  
Saratoga, N. Y., Sept. 6.—Governor Roosevelt, after his speech in the Republican State Convention here, will depart on his Western speech making tour as outlined by himself and the managers of the Republican National Committee. Governor Roosevelt will be at Helena, Mont., on Sept. 17; Butte, Mont., Sept. 18; Pocatello, Idaho, Sept. 19; Ogden, Utah, Sept. 20; Salt Lake, Sept. 21, and will speak at Evanston, Wyo., on the 22d. He will speak at Denver Sept. 25. After a tour through Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa, he will arrive at Chicago on Oct. 6.
