POPULATION OF THE STATES IS ANNOUNCED

OVER SEVENTY-SIX MILLIONS DOMICILED IN UNITED STATES.

Gain During Ten Years Over Thirteen Millions, Representing Increase of Nearly 21 Per Cent.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The official announcement of the total population of the United States for 1900 is 76,255,229, of which 74,627,907 are contained in the forty-five states, representing approximately the population to be used for apportionment purposes. There is a total population of 134,158 Indians, not taxed. The total population in 1890, with which the aggregate population of the present census should be compared, was 63,069,756. Taking the 1890 population as a basis, there has been a gain in population of 13,225,464 during the last ten years, representing an increase of nearly 21 per cent.

Following is the official announcement of the population of the United States in 1900 by states. In the figures the first column represents the census for 1900 and the second 1890.

The Alaskan figures are derived from partial data only and all returns for Alaska and for certain military organizations stationed abroad, particularly in the Philippines, have not yet been received.

The cost of the administration of the census bureau up to the date, including the expense incident to the preliminary work, as well as the cost of the enumeration and supervision, is \$6,361,951, of which over \$4,000,000 has been expended for supervision and enumeration.

GEORGE GOULD BECOMES TRUSTEE FOR CASTELLANE

PARIS, Oct. 31.—The civil tribunal has appointed George J. Gould trustee for the Countess Castellane his sister. According to the pleadings in the case, her husband, Count Boni de Castellane, spent 23,000,000 francs in four years, whereas his income from his wife's fortune is only 3,000,000 francs.

The action was the result of a suit brought by Mr. Gould against his sister. The court granted his request and appointed him trustee. The proceedings were conducted in secret session, only the bare decision being announced.

The Castellanes are now staying in the country together.

PHILADELPHIA SUGAR IMPORTS BEAT RECORDS

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 31.—The imports of sugar at this port during October eclipsed the record for any corresponding period in the history of the port. More than 50,000 tons of raw sugar have been delivered on the sugar refineries' wharves since October 1st. The arrivals have been nine steamships from Java and the far east and three full-rigged American sailing ships from the Hawaiian Islands. Enough material has been delivered here to insure the running on full time throughout the entire winter of the local refineries.
