News of the Town.

Thanksgiving services will be held at the Central Union Church at 11 o'clock this morning.
The many friends of George Farr are congratulating him upon the arrival in his family of a bouncing baby girl.
Alex Raymond, a native of Canada, was yesterday admitted to citizenship by Judge Estee. Mr. Raymond is an employe of Benson, Smith & Co.
As many friends will deeply regret to learn that Major J. N. Wright, the old veteran of the Civil War, is seriously ill at his home at Independence Park.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Oceanic Gas & Electric Co., Ltd., will be held on Friday, Nov. 30th, at 3 o'clock p. m., at the office of M. P. Robinson, Spreckels' building.
The Japanese of the city are already laying their plans for the celebration of their New Year. A meeting will be held early next week to make arrangements for a big feast at the Japanese Consulate or some other place that may be decided on.

The official letter of Governor Dole to Treasurer Lansing establishing the new saloon limits left out the Union saloon (Cunha). It is understood from the Treasurer that this was an oversight, it always being the intention to continue the license at that place.
Road Supervisor Marston Campbell estimates that the damage to streets by the storm of Sunday night will be between \$5,000 and \$6,000. It will take a month of the hardest kind of work, says the Supervisor, to place matters in as good shape as they were before the flood.

Mrs. Nawahi has gone to Hilo in the Kinau to assist in the arrangements in connection with the big fair and luau to be given soon for the purpose of raising money for an organ for Hilo church. Mrs. Nawahi has been working diligently for the cause and has succeeded in raising in the neighborhood of \$150 in cash in Honolulu alone.

BOXES SENT TO HILO.

Postoffice Officials Return From a Tour of Big Island.

As a result of a visit to Hilo by Postoffice Inspector Robinson and Assistant Postmaster Kenake, 215 private boxes for the Hilo postoffice have been forwarded to that city. This is an improvement that has been wanted by Hilo people for some time. It will be made at the expense of the department and will cost \$300 or more.

Another result of this visit is a call for the newspapers to be more careful in addressing papers to out of town subscribers. The rules for forwarding their addresses is much more strict under the present, than under the old Hawaiian system. Persons in the country can assist the papers a great deal by sending in their definite addresses.

Steamer Ellhu Thompson From Seattle Hourly Expected With Cargo.

The local agents for the Seattle Brewing and Malting Company expect the arrival of the Thompson at any moment and were disappointed that she did not get in yesterday afternoon.

The Thompson's liquid cargo consists mostly of draught beer and the amount is unknown here, but it will probably be sufficient to carry on the local trade until the ship Iroquois with 4000 barrels of bottle beer arrives. She is now on the way but like all sailing vessels the time of her arrival is largely problematical. This being the main source of supply for Honolulu beer drinkers will soon terminate an era of suspended happiness.


